How well do I recall the day When I was but a lad, How very proudly I surveyed The first boots that I had!

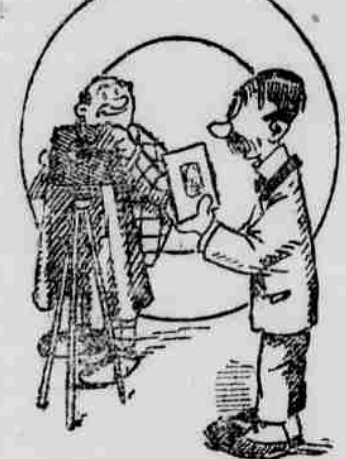
But now I've grown to man's estate, The truth I'm bound to tell; There are some other boots that I Remember quite as well.
