SCHOOL NOTES.

Last week Mr. N. C. Maris, State Field Worker, and the writer visited twenty-one schools and organized industrial clubs in the most of them. We found one club fully organized and several more just ready to complete the organization. There seems to be a lively interest in this line of work. Pupils find that it is not intended in any way to interfere with their regular school work, but is so planned as to give them opportunity to educate the hand. Very few schools are prepared to give manual training and work in domestic science and gardening, but the industrial club affords an opportunity to do some very valuable work along these lines. It has been found in the counties where it has been tried the longest that in many instances it strengthens the regular school work. It also affords a means of cultivating industry during the long vacation.

Pupils who have not enrolled in any club may take up the work individually. They will have the same opportunity of exhibiting at the county fair. At the State fair they would not have the credit due to club work. The club workers must read carefully the bulletins and the directions in regard to keeping their project records. The record will not count as many points as it did last year, but it is a vital part of the work.

We expect to have a much larger exhibit at the county fair this fall than we had last fall. There will be some prizes for individual work, but the prizes for the club work will be more attractive than they were last year.

Next week mention of some of the school improvements noted on this trip will receive attention.
