CHILD WELFARE CONFERENCE IN PORTLAND

Hon. P. P. Claxton, United States Commissioner of Education has sent out invitations to the city superintendents, county superintendents, and teachers to attend the conference to be held at Portland, Oregon, May 12-16 under the leadership of the National Congress of Mothers and Parent-Teachers Association working jointly with the Home Education Division of the U. S. Bureau of Education. This conference will be merged with the annual Child Welfare Conference. Representative women from each community are also urged to attend. This is one of a series of conferences to be held at Chicago, St. Paul, Bismark, Butte, Helena, Seattle, Portland and San Francisco. The Portland meeting is to be the most important of the entire series. The advisory council of this organization is composed of such men as Theodore Roosevelt, Robert Collier, Rev. Newell Dwight Hillis, and Dr. Geo. E. MacLean. Some of the ablest speakers on child welfare topics will appear on the program at Portland.
