In his attempt to hold the animals, Mr. Curran was pulled from his seat and the heavily loaded wagon passed over him. He was on his way to Heppner with his wool and the accident occurred near Lexington. The injured man was taken to the Heppner Sanatorium, in a paralyzed condition and it was found that his spine was badly injured, his legs being helpless from the knees down. Although he is slowly improving, it will probably be weeks before he will be able to leave the hospital.

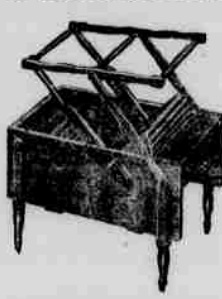
