ions with us today, we give a "God
bless you" for what you have done
and for what you are doing.

In casting about for a suitable text
for this occasion, my eye fell upon
the words of an old soldier who was
just being promoted to the ranks
above. He had bravely fought for
the right. His struggle was over. As
he put off his battle-scarred armor,
he said: "I have fought a good
fight." You soldiers of the Civil War
responded to the call of duty. You
fought until danger to the Union was
passed. You were then mustered out.
We trust that within your heart, each
could say, "I have fought a good
fight."

We come at this time to ask what
constitutes a good fight? First, a
good fight must be in a good cause.
Victory in a bad cause is only appar-
ent or temporary. Victory often
perches on the banner of those who
seem to be the weaker. "God is on
the side of the heavier artillery,"
facetiously remarked Napoleon. But
his own theory was disproved at
Waterloo, when 160 English cannon
overcame 250 of the French.

The noblest tribute I ever heard to
the Union cause, was given by the
silver-tongued Colonel Geo. W. Bain,
who fought on the losing side in our
war. Speaking to a Northern audi-
ence he said: "You came down
South and whipped us. But you did
it do it because you had better sol-
diers, or better generals. You did it
because the God of Battles was on
your side."

The strongest cause is the cause
that is right. For:
"Right is right since God is God.
And right the day must win."

with courage. The good soldier en-
lists realizing that it is his business
to die if need be. His personal safety
counts as nothing. The Cause is ev-
erything. History, ancient or mod-
ern, gives nothing more heroic than
the charge of Major Keenan and his
three hundred cavalry at Chancellors-
ville. When the Confederate forces
had flanked the Federal's position,
General Pleasanton turned to Major
Keenan and said: "Major, I want you
to hold the enemy in check until I
can get these cannon placed and
loaded." "I'll do it, General," said
Keenan, "but you know that it means
the sacrifice of every one of my men."
Into the face of ten thousand flew the
noble three hundred, not one return-
ing.

Faith nerves the arm for a good
fight. Doubly armed is he who be-
lieves not only in the justness of his
cause, but has confidence in its ulti-
mate success. During the Spanish-
American War five men sailed into
the harbor of Porto Rico, demanded
and received the surrender of the
Spanish garrison. They were able
to do this because they knew and the
garrison knew, that just outside the
harbor, lay the American gunboats,
ready to back up their demand.

The soldiers who wore the blue
and those who wore the grey, were
good soldiers because they believed
in their cause. I am glad that we
have come to a time when we can be
just in the criticism of those whom
we believe fought on the wrong side.
I am glad that upon a Southern bat-
tlefield has been erected one monu-
ment to the memory of the Blue and
the Grey.

Since no question is settled until
it is settled right, a good fight must
be continued until victory comes.
The war must go on for "all sum-
mer" or many summers.

Our soldiers of the Civil War could
not settle our National questions for
all time. The war is still on. Young
America still has the opportunity for
heroic service to his country. God
forbid that he should be called to the
same sort of warfare that our sol-
diers passed through. We do not
want war. Some of the younger gen-
eration may believe in the glory of
war, but I find that those who know
it from experience, agree with Gen-
eral Sherman in his characterization.
The Mexican situation has threat-
ened to plunge us into war with our
sister Republic. It is true that Amer-
icans have been slain. Our provoca-
tion has been great. But were we
to seek redress in war, rivers of blood

would flow.

It seems at times as if we would
yet be drawn into the European war.
But here again we should thank God
for a President who refuses to allow
hot headed politicians or yellow
journalism to rush us into this trage-
dy of the ages.

This Memorial day with these vet-
erans present brings to you and me
a challenge to live for our country
as heroically as their comrades died for
it. You, the remaining portion of
our great army, gave yourselves as
unselfishly as did those who fell. We
would honor you today by unselfish-
ly taking up the burdens of citizen-
ship and serving our country loyally
in the great army of Peace.

While our flag has been insulted
by a foreign nation, I do not consider
this as great a menace to us as the
fact that many of our young people
are growing up with but little ap-
preciation of the flag. Our foreign
hordes coming, many from oppressive
governments, with hatred burning in
their hearts for all government, these
present to us a real problem.

Every such occasion as this calls
upon us, my fellow-citizens, to honor
the flag by dedicating our lives to its
service in either private or public
life. We are often shocked by the
discovery of corruption in the ad-
ministration of civic affairs. But
back of such corruption often is a
slumbering public conscience. Our
need is for a new birth of patriotism
that shall demand from the petty
officials of our municipalities the
same conscientious service that we
expect from our president.

Some years ago a banquet was
held in the city of St. Louis, which
was attended by some of its leading
business men. At the close of the
repart the band played "America."
The company arose and joined hands
in singing the familiar words. As
the last strain of that song died away
one of the men, with tears of patriot-
ic pride coursing down his cheeks,
said: "Oh, that I could die for my
country." Just three weeks after
that he was cringing at the bar of
justice, confessing that he had bribed
an entire municipal assembly to
pass a railroad franchise bill. With
patriotism on his lips he had treason
in his heart. He was willing to die
for his country, but unwilling to live
for it.

Soldiers, you bring to us a message
this morning. We would honor you
by living for the country for which
you offered your lives.
