Mr. and Mrs. Emmet Cochran motored over from their ranch near Monument yesterday.

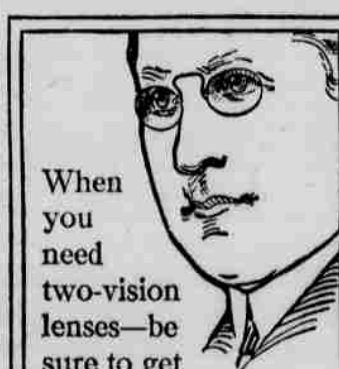

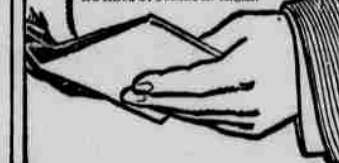
