Therefore the Marshal has been instructed to kill all dogs found running at large without muzzles within the corporate limits of the City of Heppner on or after July 25th, 1915.

Due notice will be given when this order is annulled.

This order will be strictly enforced. People outside the city limits are requested to keep dogs at home as there will be no exception made. Rabies has deased to be a joke and the welfare of the people demands this
