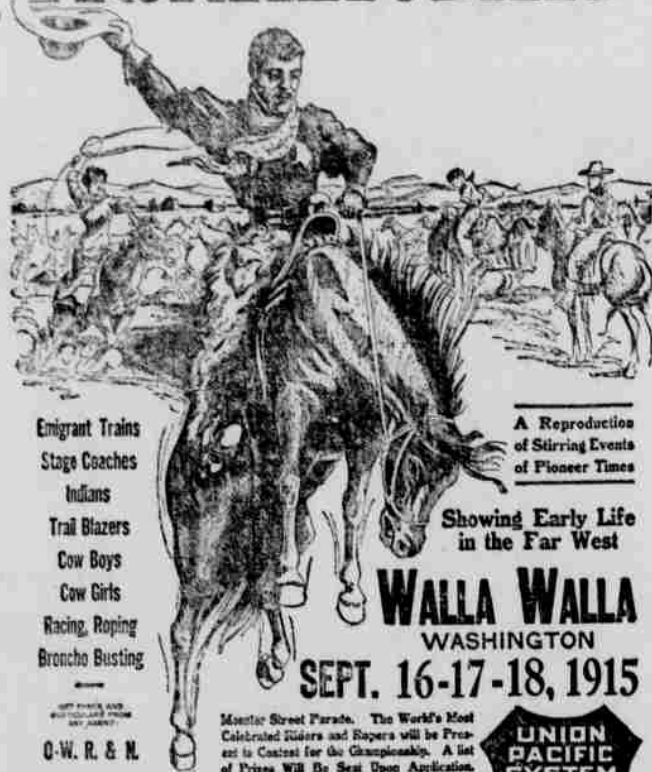

Myrtle Point will add to water supply.

Big run of salmon is on in Rogue River.

Clatskanie will pave three blocks for a starter.

Halfway carried \$20,000 bonds for water system.

Albany Lumber Co. mill started last week with a crew of 20 men.

Bishop & Son of Pendleton have purchased Washougal woolen mill.

Franchise has been granted United Railways over Linnton-Portland road.

Nehalem is constructing a 200,000-gallon reservoir for water supply.

Present prospects indicate record-breaking crowd at Pendleton Round-Up with larger number of easterners.

The St. Helens Shipbuilding Co. has contracts reaching far into next year.

A stringent ordinance for the regulation of jitneys is to be passed in Salem.

It is reported that the Corvallis & Eastern will electrify from Albany to Corvallis.

The third dredge is to be installed by the Powder River Gold Co. at Sumpter.

The west half of Washington street, Portland, will be paved with bitulithic.

Hoppeking is now in full swing in Oregon and thousands are being given employment.

Portland is still investigating the \$450,000 increase in city expenses during past year.

Going and Harvey Furniture Co. will erect a fine building on Broadway in Marshfield.

Recall elections in several counties prove little more than farces. They increase public expenses and accomplish nothing.

Portland's municipal wood pile is still on its hands but the city can stand it as the taxpayer is always ready to foot the bill.

The liner Rose City will be overhauled in Portland and \$50,000 spent on new boilers making her one of the best boats on the coast.

Oregon Voter—When the employer is making a profit employment is plentiful. Legislate the employer out of his profit, and the army of the unemployed fills the highways.

"The State Engineer boosts the peat marshes," is a story sent out from a capital press bureau. All it boasts is the \$100,000 or \$200,000 a year that department costs the taxpayers.

The Oregon Lumber Co. of Hood River, has completed a 2200-foot highline to move logs to its mills and has 175 men in the woods. The lumber cut is used to build the Ogden and Idaho electric.

Following on the heels of the new Seaman's Bill which stops all American shipping to foreign ports by its drastic regulations, a Japanese company has placed orders for six 12,000-ton steamers to be built at once.

The Industrial Relations Commission has published a report criticising most everything that has been done in an industrial way during the past 10 or 15 years and making out that the general run of employers are worse than slave-drivers. Like most of these commissions, however, it can find lots of fault but can offer no remedy as the members composing it are mere politicians who never maintained a dollar payroll for anybody and in most cases are unable to manage a business of their own.

In his speech at Portland, former President Taft referred to Oregon and Washington as "sort of National laboratory to test all sorts of governmental inventions." He charged the two northwestern states to proceed with their experiments under the watchful eyes of their sister states of the East, which "doubtless will follow those that by actual practice you find to be worthy of permanent use."

"We will all get to the same place, anyway," he continued, "but maybe by different paths and by different bills of expense."

Mr. Boylen is now busy with the hay harvest and made the trip to this city to secure men to assist him in the work. Mr. Boylen, in company with Smythe brothers of Pendleton and Arlington, has recently filed papers for the incorporation of a firm for the purpose of buying and selling sheep. The new company is capitalized at \$5000.

George Chapin called at this office while in town Tuesday. He has suffered greatly by the grasshopper pest this season, his place being literally cleaned up of everything green. The pests were not satisfied to rid him of his garden and they have stripped his fruit trees of foliage and bark and Mr. Chapin fears that his orchard, of which he was very proud, has been entirely destroyed. Other residents of his neighborhood have suffered in a similar manner and the financial loss to that section is heavy. This is the second year of the grasshopper pest and they seem to be much worse than they were a year ago; just what will happen another year from them is hard to say and it is to be hoped that some means of destroying the insects will be devised before another crop season arrives.

Will Expand Next Season.

W. H. Padberg, successful farmer of Clarks Canyon, visited in Heppner Saturday. He is finishing up the season's run with his big threshing outfit and is well satisfied with results. Next season he contemplates doing more threshing for his neighbors, and will extend his operations into the McMillan and Pointer section north of Lexington, where he can get in a good lot of work before the grain is ready in his locality. The plan of heading and threshing that Mr. Padberg follows is proving to be the most satisfactory method of gathering in the grain crop, and it will be more generally adopted by our farmers.

Encouraging the Boys.

Opportunity will be offered to 25 Oregon boys to attend the Agricultural College summer camp school, all expenses paid, if the plans now under way mature successfully. N. C. Maris, of the State Educational department, and F. L. Griffin, state agent of boys' and girls' industrial clubs, have agreed upon the general features of the plan, which provides for sending the winner of each of the 25 main and subdivision projects in which the industrial club is to be carried this year, to the popular Boys' Short Course at the College next summer. It is the plan of the departments to have all expenses of every winner fully paid from the time he leaves until he returns, no matter what part of the state he comes from.
