NEW ORDINANCES PASSED BY CITY COUNCIL

ORDINANCE NO. 153.

AN ORDINANCE providing for building permits and the method of issuing the same and providing a penalty for building any building or addition to any building without a building permit.

The People of the City of Heppner do Ordain as follows:

SECTION 1.

No person or persons shall erect any building or any addition to any building within the City of Heppner without first having obtained a building permit authorizing him to erect such building or addition.

SECTION 2.

Any person or persons desiring to erect any building or addition to any building within the City of Heppner may obtain a permit authorizing the erection of such building or addition upon application to the Committee on Fire and Water of the City of Heppner. Such application shall contain such information as to location, exposures, kind of structure, materials to be used in the construction, and such other information as the Committee on Fire and Water may deem proper to enable the said Committee to determine whether such structure shall be one which will be safe and not a menace to the surrounding property.

SECTION 3.

Upon due investigation of such application, if the Committee on Fire and Water shall deem such structure a safe structure and not a menace to the surrounding property, the said Committee shall issue such permit; if, however, the said Committee shall deem such structure unsafe or a menace to the surrounding property, the said Committee shall deny such permit. If the person or persons applying for such permit shall feel aggrieved at the action of the said Committee, such person or persons may appeal from the decision of the said Committee to the City Council of the City of Heppner, and the decision of the City Council shall be final.

SECTION 4.

When any application for a building permit shall be pending before said Committee or the City Council, any property owner owning property which may be affected by the erection of such structure may be heard in protest against the issuance of such permit, and any such owner so protesting may appeal from the decision of the said Committee to the City Council, and pending such appeal the said Committee shall not issue the permit in question.

SECTION 5.

Any person violating any of the provisions of this ordinance shall upon conviction in the Recorder's Court, be fined not to exceed one hundred dollars, or be imprisoned in the City Jail not to exceed fifty days.

ORDINANCE NO. 154.

AN ORDINANCE to provide for decayed, unoccupied, and unsafe buildings; to provide for declaring buildings and awnings damaged by fire nuisances; to provide for declaring old and decayed awnings nuisances; to provide for the abatement of such nuisances; and to provide for the inspection of buildings to determine whether such buildings are unsafe, decayed, or unoccupied.

The People of the City of Heppner do Ordain as follows:

SECTION 1.

Whenever the City Marshal of the City of Heppner shall be informed or shall have reason to believe that any building within the City of Heppner is in a condition of decay, or is unsafe, or is unoccupied, and by reason

of such decay, lack of safety, or lack of occupancy, such building shall be deemed by said City Marshal to constitute a nuisance, the said Marshal shall inspect the same and report the condition of such building to the Committee on Fire and Water of the City of Heppner, and for the purpose of making such inspection the said Marshal shall have authority to enter upon the premises where such building is situated and may require the owner of such building or the person in charge of such building to open the same at any reasonable time for such inspection.

SECTION 2.

The said Committee on Fire and Water, upon receipt of such report from the City Marshal, may make such further investigation as they may deem necessary and proper. If in the judgment of such Committee said building shall constitute a nuisance by reason of such condition of decay, unsafety, or lack of occupancy said Committee shall declare the same to be a nuisance, and shall authorize the City Marshal to notify the owner or person in charge of such building to remove the same, or put it into a condition of safety, or to have the same occupied or otherwise properly cared for if unoccupied, as the case may be. If such person shall not proceed to obey the orders of the City Marshal acting under the direction of said Committee within five days, then the City Marshal shall take such steps as shall be necessary to carry out the orders of the said Committee, and the cost of abating such nuisance shall become a lien upon the premises upon which such building is situated and upon the proper entry of such lien in the Lien Docket of the City of Heppner by the City Recorder shall become enforceable in the same manner as a lien for the construction of a sidewalk by the City.

SECTION 3.

Whenever any awning shall be damaged by fire or shall be in a state of decay, the same may be declared a nuisance and the same may be abated in the same manner as above provided for abating a nuisance in the case of a building; and when any building shall be damaged by fire the same may be declared a nuisance in the same manner as a building in a state of decay, or unsafe, or unoccupied, and may be abated as above provided for abatement of nuisances of decayed, unsafe, or unoccupied buildings.

SECTION 4.

Whenever any person shall feel aggrieved at the decision of the said Committee on Fire and Water, he may appeal from the said decision to the City Council, and upon such appeal the decision of the City Council shall be final.

SECTION 5.

Any person violating any of the provisions of this ordinance shall, upon conviction in the Recorder's Court, be fined not to exceed one hundred dollars, or be imprisoned in the City Jail not to exceed fifty days.
