State Game Warden Service.

According to the Federal authorities in charge of game protection, about one-third of the States have made important changes in the administration of game warden service. During 1915 Arkansas established a State game and fish commission of four members, while Florida abolished the office of State game and fish commissioner and intrusted the work of enforcement to county wardens. The total number of States which have general officers in charge of game-law enforcement remains the same as last year, and four States—Florida, Mississippi, Nevada, and Virginia—still rely on local officers. Reorganization of commissions resulted in Minnesota and New York in the substitution of a single officer in place of a commission; in Michigan in the combination of the game, fish, and forest department with the public domain commission; and in Wisconsin in the consolidation of the work of the game-warden department with that of several other State offices under a new conservation commission. In Illinois the title of the commission was changed from conservation commission to game and fish commission; in North Dakota to game and fish board; and in Ohio from an agricultural commission to a board of agriculture—the latter without salary. In Oregon the board was reorganized with the governor as chairman, and two members from west of the Cascades and two from the eastern part of the State. The position of warden of Tennessee was placed on a salary basis of \$2,500 per annum; the salary of the secretary of the Pennsylvania commission was made \$3,000; the salary of the secre-

tary of the North Dakota game board \$1,200, and the salary of the State warden of New Mexico was increased from \$1,800 to \$2,000. Apparently the only important decrease was in the compensation of the conservation commission of New York from \$10,000 to \$8,000.

Increases in the number of wardens were authorized in several of the States. In Illinois the addition included 1 district warden and 18 deputies; in New Hampshire, 10 wardens; in New Jersey, an assistant fish and game protector; in North Dakota, a State game and fish commissioner; in Pennsylvania, 20 protectors; in South Dakota, 1 additional assistant in the office and one in charge of the game farm; in Washington, 4 special deputy wardens; and in Wyoming, 3 additional assistants.

The discovery of artesian water in Morrow County, Oregon, is causing no end of rejoicing on the part of residents of that territory. According to agricultural authorities who have investigated the climatic and soil conditions of that part of the state there is no other dry section that gives so much promise of productivity, once it is fed with water, than does Morrow County. This knowledge has influenced many a homesteader and persevering farmer to hold on to his property with the hope that it would some day be reclaimed through irrigation. It is to these that the discovery of an abundance of water is bringing the greatest rejoicing.

There have been several previous efforts to strike water in this section, and the final success is entirely due to W. D. Newlon, who persevered after three years of failure. Although residents of the section held out little hope for his success, the O-W-R. & N. and its agricultural expert, "Farmer" C. L. Smith, have been tagging in their support of the work. Mr. Newlon has been carrying on the officials of the railroad company, therefore, feel almost as highly elated over the discovery as do the farmers who will be directly benefited.

Last week, William McMurray, general passenger agent of the O-W-R. & N., together with several other prominent officials of the company, at the invitation of the people of Morrow county, journeyed out to attend the celebration and dedication of the water gusher. In speaking of the importance of the discovery Mr. McMurray said:

"The greatest need of Oregon is settlers, and the greatest deterring influence to contend with is the fact that so much of the moderately priced land has been undeveloped because of a lack of sufficient water. Without an underground flow of water to draw upon, the cost of irrigation project in many localities would bring the price of the land to a prohibitive figure.

"The artesian supply that Mr. Newlon has discovered is in the heart of a district that needs only the addition of water and a plow to make of a fertile prairie a productive home for hundreds of settlers. Surrounding it are several hundred thousand acres of very fertile land, lying quite level and easy to irrigate. The climate is mild, with a long season free from frost. The present rainfall is only from 7 to 10 inches, which has made dry farming in this section very much of a gamble; but the soil is so deep and rich that a very little water will serve to produce abundant crops.

"While the addition of water adds to the value of the land, we want settlers to know that they will be able to buy it at from \$10 to \$20 an acre, and his company will be glad to aid them in getting it in the right location so that they will have water for irrigation. Mr. Newlon, who owns all water rights to the well, aims to provide artesian irrigation on a 10 to 20-year payment basis, and at one-half the price settlers would have to pay to irrigation companies where big expenditures have been necessary in order to get the water on the land.

"The one thing that we want to avoid is boosting the price beyond the ability of the average farmer to pay. By getting settlers on that land not only will the immediate district prosper, but the state as a whole will prosper."

sufficient sums of money to more than pay all the expenses of operation, so that every dollar collected from employers and workmen alike is paid back directly to injured workmen in first aid and for time lost. Numbers of farmers and a great many manufacturers in times past have afforded themselves liability insurance from insurance companies and in such cases the amount received by the workmen is questionable as more than half of it is used by the company in expenses and profit and a considerable portion of that remaining is dissipated by the injured workman in lawyer's fees and court costs in suing for his rights.
