DEEP MOISTURE STORAGE.

Deep storage of moisture, requisite
to successful dry farming, can be se-
cured only by keeping the surface soil
in an absorptive, sponge-like condi-
tion, says Professor H. D. Scudder,
the O. A. C. agronomist. This should
be continued as far as possible
through the entire precipitation peri-
od, by good preparation of the soil.
Plowing and disking and increasing
the humus content of the soil are
the chief means of keeping the sur-
face conditions favorable, permitting
the moisture to strike in both by per-
colation and capillary attraction
downward. If the surface soil is
loosely compacted during winter and
early spring the surface water runs
off, damaging the surface by wash-
ings and the subsoils by keeping
them dry. Roots of crops grown on
soils in this condition lack the mois-
ture and feeding area to be secured
in dry farming countries chiefly from
deeply stored moisture.

OREGON'S BEST IS NOW ON DISPLAY

Grains, Grasses, Flowers, Fruits and
Made Wares Assembled From
Every Section.

Portland, Or., Oct. 25. (Special)—
The Ancient Greeks thought that
Ceres was the Goddess of cereals and
other land products, but that's where
the Greeks fell down. It's Oregon,
and her headquarters are Portland,
where she has successfully mobilized
her choicest in every line. Amidst
the bursting of areal bombs and the
rumbling of drums, she unrolled her
panoply of Oregon's best last night,
and today the sun looks down upon
as fine a sight as was ever afforded
by a display of choicest products of
farm and factory. The Manufactur-
ers' and Land Products Show is of-
ficially and practically open, and Ore-
gonians, as well as less fortunate citi-
zens of this common country, can
view the state's products at their
best.

Possibly an airship journey over
the best of the state's richest agri-
cultural and manufacturing districts,
with crops and made-ware at their
maximum and best, would give a
careful observer a pretty good idea
of what the state can do. Much the
same effect is secured by a watchful
excursion through the long, booth-
lined alleys of the Armory, followed
by a birdseye view of the whole from
the upper gallery. Looking down
upon the assembled displays is indeed
a more pleasant, economical and pre-
cise way of sizing up the producing
capacity of the state.

Most counties have taken advan-
tage of the opportunity thus afforded
of getting their best resource attrac-
tions before the people of Portland,
of Oregon, and the "stranger that is
within our gates." The success with
which they have accomplished their
purpose has astonished themselves,
as well as the officers of the Show.
Of the many remarkable features
perhaps there is nothing more sig-
nificant than the corn exhibits, which
clearly lift Oregon out of the list of
non-corn producing states and estab-
lishes its kinship with the great corn
belt states. Many counties, state in-
stitutions, and the O-W. R. & N. Co.,
have exhibits that show production of
sixty to one hundred bushels of good
true-to-type corn per acre.

One of the important educational
exhibits is that of the Agricultural
College, featuring the corn and other
special lines of work of the girls' and
boys' industrial clubs. These young
people have been among the first to
demonstrate the possibilities of corn
in Oregon. Not merely the products
are displayed but the records of the
practices whereby results were se-
cured are exhibited. This collection
from the College is only a part of the
display, which includes a graphic
representation of how the different
College departments are organized,
the relation of each to the farmers
and other producers, and most of all,
how growers can avail themselves of
the information, recommendations,
co-operation and general assistance
of the work of the whole institution,
through the extension division. Char-
acteristic exhibits are also shown
each of the seven branch stations.
The University and Reed College also
have extension displays that make
plain the manner of securing help in
their respective lines.
