According to Mr. Newlon, the flow has never shown any signs of weakening and of a more recent date a greater volume of water has been coming out of the gusher. Just where Mr. Newlon will drill his next well we have not learned, but it is understood that several farmers in the vicinity of the Rice farm will have Mr. Newlon drill for artesian water.

Farmers, livestock owners, breeders and others will be interested to learn that the fifth Annual International Livestock Exposition to be held at the Union Stockyards, North Portland, from December 6 to 11 inclusive, gives promise of being one of the most successful yet held. During these six days there will be held conventions and meetings of the Oregon Jersey Cattle Club, Oregon Guernsey Cattle Club, Oregon-Washington-Idaho-Montana Swine Breeders' Association, Oregon Holstein Cattle Club, Northwest Shorthorn Association, Oregon Butter and Cheese Makers' Association and all to conclude with the Breeders' and Stockmen's Banquet.

The judging dates on livestock exhibits will be held December 6 and 7. No entries will be accepted for any breeding classes after November 27. December 11 the big Hereford event of the year—the Hereford Cattle Sale—will take place, under the auspices of R. J. Kinzer, Secretary of the American Hereford Cattle Breeders' Association. Geo. A. Gue is manager for the Third Annual Registered Holstein Sale, occurring December 10. A particularly interesting date is that of December 8, when the sale of Champion individuals and car lots will be held.

Prospective buyers will be interested to learn that to the purchaser of two or more carloads of stock, of any kind, railroad fare will be refunded to such purchaser on presentation of railroad receipt from railroad agent, showing amount of fare paid.

Fight to be Made for Sugar Duty.

Producers of sugar in the United States will make a strenuous fight in congress to preserve the present duty on imported sugar, because they now enjoy an "indirect subsidy" of about \$38,000,000 a year, is the assertion of Frank S. Lowry, manager of the sales department of the Federal Sugar Refining company.

The tariff law provides that sugar shall go on the free list next May, and according to Lowry, this means consumers will be able to buy sugar one cent a pound cheaper than they can at present.

College Sheep Make Winning at Exposition.

Oregon Agricultural College, Corvallis, Nov. 22.—Sheep from the Agricultural College have been added to the long list of Oregon winners at the Panama-Pacific Exposition. A telegram from O. M. Nelson, in charge of the Animal Husbandry exhibit at the Exposition, says that important places were taken by the sheep as follows:

Pure-bred Shropshire yearling wethers, first, second and third; pen of three pure-bred Shropshire yearling wethers, first and championship; pure-bred Shropshire fat lamb, second, fifth and sixth; pen of grade lambs, second and third; and carlot of fat lambs, third.

In addition to these winnings the College sheep commanded a good price from discriminating buyers for the sales made. Four pure-bred Shropshire lambs were sold to Nolan & Finch, of Soda Springs, Idaho, winners of first in carlot fat lambs, at \$50 each, and the pen of wether lambs was sold for fancy mutton at 10 1/2 cents per pound.

Great interest centered in the carlot class. Nolan & Finch have cleaned up in this class all over the country, notably at the great shows of Chicago and Denver. They are extensive growers and breeders, having thousands of animals to make up their exhibition lot from, while some of the college and university exhibits were made up from very small flocks. Second place was taken by the Butterfield Livestock Company, of Weiser, Idaho, and fourth and fifth places were won by the University of California.
