OF GENERAL INTERESTProspects are that Klamath Falls
mills will run all winter.Hermiston is working for a new li-
brary.A movement is on in Scio to im-
prove the streets.Talbot, on the Oregon Electric, has
dedicated a new school house.The first cornmeal ever ground in
Hood River has just been turned out.Payette is promised a \$50,000 ho-
tel.Port of Astoria will erect a \$22,-
000 grain elevator.The St. Helens cannery shipped a
carload of canned beans to Seattle.Newport will have a radio station
at an early date.Sauerkraut is being canned at Eu-
gene on a large scale.Twohy Bros. have added a new en-
gine to Grants Pass road.Reports are that Agness will have
new 20-room hotel.The Lloyd hotel at Marshfield will
be entirely remodeled.Camas Valley farmers vote to im-
prove Myrtle Point-Roseburg road.The Hunt Bros. cannery, Salem,
shipped a carload of loganberries to
Chicago—brought \$3600.Reports say that tie camp at Flo-
rence will be opened at once employ-
ing 100 men.Eugene cannery has received con-
tract for a carload of canned cabbage
for U. S. army.The Commercial Club at Enter-
prise celebrated the opening of the
Eastern Oregon Lumber Co.'s mill
with a big banquet.Sufficient acreage has been signed
up, according to reports, to secure the
building of a large beet sugar factory
in Southern Oregon.The Southern Oregon Traction Co.
will extend its electric line from Med-
ford to Jacksonville, work to begin
January 1.New town of Boardman has just
been platted near junction of Coyote
Cutoff and Spokane branch of O-W.
R. & N. Co. in Morrow county.The ministers of the Christian and
Episcopal churches in Eugene are
using newspaper advertising to fill
their pews and have had overflow
crowds as a result.The S. P. Co. employs 5000 people
in Oregon, paying them \$4,750,000
annually and \$1,200,000 taxes or 12
per cent of the taxes collected by
counties through which its line runs.Oregon fir will be used in the floor
of the Dalles post office instead of
Southern yellow pine as specified.
Similar substitutions are planned in
other federal buildings in Oregon.Manager Norman of the Oregon
Power Co., Eugene, reports decided
feeling of optimism among merchants
and bankers and inquiries about pow-
er and light from farmers and mer-
chants.Thrift Essay Contests for Adults and
Children.Oregon Agricultural College, Cor-
vallis, Dec. 7.—Cash prizes aggregat-
ing \$250 will be paid to winners of
the S. W. Strauss essay contests on
thrift, in the children's class, and
\$1100 to winners in the adult class.First prize in the children contest
is \$100, second \$50, third and fourth
\$25 each, and fifth, sixth, seventh,
eighth and ninth, \$10 each. Leading
prize in the adult class is \$750, with
\$250 second and \$100 third.The children's essays are to con-
tain not to exceed 1000 words. Ad-
ults must not exceed 5000, including
methods of introducing thrift into
the public schools.County superintendents and city
superintendents in cities of 4000 or
more population, are expected to try
to secure contests in their jurisdic-
tion. Notification of intent to contest
should be sent as early as possible,
either to Dean J. A. Bexell, O. A. C.,
Corvallis, or to D. W. Springer, sec-
retary of the National Educational
Association, Ann Arbor, Michigan.
Full particulars may be had by ap-
plication, either to Dean Bexell, who is
a member of the thrift committee of
America, or to Mr. Springer.
