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NEW DRY LAW IS MADE PLAIN

From and after the 1st day of January, 1916, no intoxicating liquors shall be manufactured or sold in Oregon, except for medicinal purposes upon prescription of a licensed physician, or for scientific, sacramental or mechanical purposes. As the time is now drawing near there are many phases of the law that are little understood. To enlighten and inform the people of the state a "Layman's Primer" has been compiled by Attorney General George M. Brown. This is put into categorical form with the idea of answering all of the questions that might arise pertaining to the law.

In introducing this compilation of the law Mr. Brown says, "After a study of all of the prohibition law enforcement measures of the various prohibitions, we believe that Oregon has adopted one of the strongest, most comprehensive and effective prohibition laws yet written into the statute books of any state."

This primer can be secured from the Anti Saloon League, 611 Stock states which have adopted state wide Exchange Building, Portland, Oregon, for five cents per copy.

Those points covering the general provisions, common carriers, shipments and receipts are set out as follows:

Q. What is the policy of Oregon on the subject of intoxicating liquor?
A. By constitutional amendment adopted November 3, 1914, it abolished the manufacture and sale of intoxicating liquors.

Q. When does the amendment become effective?
A. January 1, 1916.

Q. What is the Anderson Law?
A. A law passed by the legislature of 1915 to carry out the terms of our "dry" constitutional amendment.

Q. Where can this law be found?
A. In the Public Acts of Oregon for 1915 at pages 159 to 170.

Q. When is this law effective?
A. January 1, 1916.

Q. What is the purpose of this law?
A. Generally to make it unlawful for any person to manufacture, sell or barter intoxicating liquors except for scientific, pharmaceutical, medicinal and mechanical purposes.

Q. For what purpose was this amendment and this law passed?
A. To protect the public health, peace and morals of Oregon.

Q. What is Intoxicating Liquor?
A. All spirituous, malt, vinous or fermented liquors, and all mixtures or preparations likely to be used as a beverage, which contain more than one-half of one per cent of alcohol by volume, and all other mixtures which are intended to produce intoxicating liquor.

Q. Who has power to administer this law?
A. Any magistrate, namely, any Justice of the Peace, District Court, Circuit, Superior or Municipal Judge, or other officer having the power of Justice of the Peace.

Q. Who prosecutes violations of the law?
A. The "prosecuting officer," who is the district attorney, his deputy or assistant, or any prosecutor appointed by the Governor to enforce this law.

Q. What liquors may a person manufacture for his own use?
A. Unfermented wine or non-intoxicating cider, wine for sacramental use, vinegar and non-intoxicating wine for use and sale from fruit exclusively grown in Oregon.

Q. May liquor be sold for any purpose?
A. Yes. Ethyl alcohol only may be sold at wholesale to druggists for medicinal, pharmaceutical, scientific and mechanical purposes, and for external use, and druggists may sell ethyl alcohol only for scientific, pharmaceutical, medicinal, and mechanical purposes and for external use under regulations hereafter explained.

Q. May a druggist sell any other kind of intoxicants but ethyl alcohol?
A. No.

Q. May a doctor?
A. No.

Q. Suppose a person does not sell it, but gives it away, or furnishes it to evade the law; what then?
A. Any shift or device or subterfuge to evade the law is an unlawful sale.

Q. How can a person obtain intoxicating liquor for personal use?
A. He can have it shipped in from outside the state.

Q. How much can he have shipped in?
A. No.

WILL SMITH DIES SUDDENLY OF HEART FAILURE

Will L. Smith, well known young business man of this city passed away suddenly in the rooms of Louis Pearson on May street yesterday evening about 6 o'clock. Death was caused by heart failure.

Mr. Smith went to the Pearson rooms yesterday about noon, after complaining to Mr. Pearson that he was not feeling well. When asked if he wanted a physician, he replied that he thought that he did. Mr. Pearson then called in Dr. McMurdo, but the young man was apparently beyond the reach of human aid. His death comes as a shock to the entire city, although it was known that he had suffered from heart trouble for the past two years. The body was taken to the Case Under-

taking parlors. The funeral will probably be held Friday afternoon at 2 o'clock from the Episcopal church. Rev. Van Waters officiating.

Mr. Smith was a native Heppner boy, having passed through the grade and high schools of this city. Shortly after his graduation from high school he took up duties as deputy county clerk, which position he held for six years. Since that time he had engaged in the abstract business with offices in the court house. He is survived by his parents, Mr. and Mrs. Arthur Smith of this city and one sister, Mrs. Annie Webster of Portland. The deceased was a member of Heppner Lodge No. 358, B. P. O. E. and this order will take charge of the funeral.

MATTIE SUMMERFIELD.

Mrs. Mattie Summerfield died at the Heppner Sanatorium last Thursday afternoon after a short illness. Diabetes is said to have been the cause of death. She was 56 years of age.

Mrs. Summerfield had been a resident of Heppner for a long number of years. She leaves to mourn her loss a son, Louis and an invalid daughter.

The funeral was held from the Christian church last Saturday afternoon, the pastor, T. S. Handsaker, conducting the service. Burial took place in the Masonic cemetery.

EARLY OREGON PIONEER PASSES

Jasper Vincent Crawford was born in Jefferson County, Indiana, August 7, 1829, and passed away in Heppner December 10, 1915.

Mr. Crawford belonged to that sturdy company of empire builders, the pioneers. With his parents he came to Oregon in 1851. The family settled temporarily in Yamhill county, locating later near Scholl's Ferry on the Tualatin river. In 1853 they moved to Linn county near Halsey. The town of Crawfordville was founded in 1866 by J. V. Crawford and his father, the former being its first postmaster.

June 11, 1876, he was married to Elizabeth E. Dunlap, a native of Linn county. To this union was born eleven children. The wife and seven children are still living. The surviving children are, Vawter, of Ione, Ore.; Mrs. Lettie Atherton, Corvallis, Ore.; Mrs. Maud Jones, Pasco, Wn.; Mrs. Gertrude Parker, Heppner;



Garfield, Fort Worth, Texas; Neal and Otheo, Heppner.

In the passing of Mr. Crawford, Heppner loses one of its most highly respected and useful citizens. During his fourteen years residence here he endeared himself to the people of Heppner and was known far and wide as the friend of every one.

The funeral services were held in the Christian Church Sunday morning at 11 o'clock, conducted by the pastor, T. S. Handsaker, assisted by Rev. Smith, of the Federated Church, and Rev. Van Waters of the Episcopal Church.

The large auditorium was filled with a concourse of friends to pay the last respects to a friend and brother. The service at the grave was conducted by the Masonic order, of which Mr. Crawford was a member.

Rev. Handsaker spoke very feelingly of his long and intimate acquaintance with the deceased. He called attention to the appropriateness of the place and hour for the service, inasmuch as Mr. Crawford was for four years pastor of this congregation and had often stood in this pulpit at this hour to proclaim the gospel and edify at the communion table.

He spoke of a sense of personal loss that he felt especially since Bro. Crawford had been, during the present pastorate, associate minister to the congregation. This office, he said, was not merely nominal, but that in many ways he had received help from the one he was glad to call his associate, and that the frequent calls which came to Bro. Crawford to conduct funerals, attested to the large hold he had upon the hearts of the community.

The texts chosen, Rev. Handsaker said, were selected from a great number of appropriate ones, but that he thought none more suitable could be found than Paul's words (II Corinthians, 12:2) "I know a man in Christ" and the promise in Revelation: "Blessed are the dead who die in the Lord" (Rev. 14:13).

He said in part: "To be in Christ, Paul tells us, is to be a new creature. The life is characterized by new motives. The worldly life consists in getting. The Christ life gives. Of the Master it was said: 'He came not to be ministered unto but to minister. Those who live in Christ will count it a privilege to serve their fellowmen. For fourteen years, Bro. Crawford
