BOARDMAN ON THE COLUMBIA IS CENTER OF LARGE IRRIGATED DISTRICT

"2600 acres adjacent to the new town of Boardman on the Columbia river will be under irrigation by Spring," said E. P. Dodd, of the Dodd-Kennedy Company, Hermiston, who was in Heppner Saturday filing a plat of the new Morrow county town with County Clerk Waters. Boardman is situated 30 miles below Hermiston on the Columbia river and consists of 55 acres of the old Boardman homestead.

One of the features of the new town is the naming of the streets. The streets have been named after other Morrow county towns, such as Heppner street, Hardman street, Lexington, Ione and Irrigon streets. Streets Dodd and Kennedy as well as Boardman street have been so dedicated in honor of the men who platted out the new town. The plat filed by Mr. Dodd was worked done by E. I. Davis, engineer on the West End Extension and the man who built the Cold Springs Reservoir.

Boardman will be the junction of

the Coyote Cut-off and men who are closely in touch with developments along the river at this point predict that the town has a great future. There are approximately 25,000 acres of irrigable land adjacent to the town which come under the ditch of the West Extension of the Umatilla project.

By Spring, stores of one kind and another will open for business in the new town and all buildings will be constructed along modern lines and foundations laid for an up-to-date city, which Boardman is destined to become. A hotel with a livery in connection is now under consideration to begin on the new structure as soon as details can be worked out. "The main canal of the West Extension," said Mr. Dodd, "is 27 miles long and lined with concrete all the way."

Diamonds from Sugar.

(Kansas City Times.) Although at first thought the statement seems incredible, it is perfectly true that a lump of sugar may be converted into diamonds.

Not all the substance of the sugar, of course, will enter into the composition of the diamond, but only the carbon that it contains. Sugar consists of carbon united with oxygen and hydrogen. It is an easy matter to separate out the carbon, and in certain experiments for the production of diamonds this sugar carbon has been employed.

The diamonds so produced were, of course, very small and destitute of commercial value, but still they were real diamonds, and the chemical result obtained would be no greater intrinsically if they were as big as the Cullinan.

Scientists have often expressed the hope that an improvement in the process of manufacturing diamonds may be effected whereby the necessity of dissolving the carbon in molten iron may be dispensed with and the required combination of great pressure with great heat may be brought about by some such operation as squeezing the carbon between red hot plates.

FINE FARM HOUSE TAKEN BY FLAMES

John Olden Loses His Rhea Creek Dwelling With All Its Contents.

John Olden lost his fine farm residence on Rhea creek by fire last Tuesday evening about 7 o'clock. Apparently the fire started in a closet off of one of the bed rooms, but its exact origin is unknown. The blaze spread so rapidly that it was impossible to remove anything from the house.

On the ranch at the time were Mr. Olden and his wife and Mrs. Olden's mother and two hired men. They all escaped from the burning building without injury.

The Olden house was built only a few years ago, and only recently Mr. Olden had made further extensive improvements. It was considered one of the finest farm dwellings in the county. Insurance which amounts to between \$2400 and \$2700 was carried on the house, but Mr. Olden is not sure of the exact amount, since all of his policies and other papers were destroyed by the flames. The house was nicely furnished and was lighted by a patent system, which Mr. Olden had installed on his farm. He places his loss at about \$12,000, after taking into consideration the loss of valuable papers which went up in smoke.

The flames fortunately did not spread to any considerable extent and the fine big barn was saved. Mr. Olden carried no insurance on the barn and it would have been a total loss had the fire once reached it.
