Curious Phenomenon at Dayville.

A series of phenomena thought to  
have had their origin at the volcano  
Mt. Lassen, nearly 300 miles away,  
began here last week, when on the  
evening of December 7 a cyclonic  
cloud formed, or drifted from the  
southwest and remained apparently  
stationary to the southwest of this  
place. A very distinct boom was  
emitted by the cloud, although at the  
time it was calm below. A heavy  
round cloud overhung this part of the  
valley the greater part of the day;  
about 7 o'clock a funnel formed on  
the southern edge of the cloud, about  
midway along its border. The lower  
edge of the funnel was turned up and  
inwards toward the center and was  
fimbriated.The next day during the afternoon  
a dense cloud of dust enveloped this  
section of the valley. The dust in  
places was opaque.It is the belief of J. Campbell Mar-  
tin, U. S. observer, that this dust  
was volcanic ash from Mt. Lassen and  
has been held in suspension in the at-  
mosphere at a great height, had pos-  
sibly been sucked into the cyclonic  
cloud whose centrifugal force caused  
the upper dust laden air to descend  
to fill the vacuum, owing to the op-  
erations the dust laden air ascended  
around and up the sides of the fun-  
nel flowed out above and quietly de-  
scended over Dayville.—Baker Her-  
ald.Chas. Chick, Miss Hotchkiss and  
Frank Cronin formed a party of  
young people who motored up to  
this city from Ione last Thursday eve-  
ning.

## Department of Botany Farmers'

Week Lectures.

Oregon Agricultural College, Cor-  
vallis, Dec. 20.—Plant diseases fre-  
quently cause more loss to growers  
than all other causes combined. A  
considerable proportion of these dis-  
eases are entirely preventable. Many  
farmers, however, have little or no  
opportunity of becoming acquainted  
with the nature of the diseases with  
which they have to contend, or with  
the methods by which they may be  
controlled. In order to meet the  
needs for information along this line  
the department of Botany and Plant  
Pathology of the Oregon Agricultural  
College has arranged to give talks at  
Farmers' Week, Jan. 3-8, upon the  
most serious diseases of Oregon crops  
and the way in which they may be  
prevented. Among others the fol-  
lowing topics of tremendous impor-  
tance to this state, will be discussed  
in a practical manner:Fire blight, apple scab, peach  
blight and peach leaf curl, brown rot  
of pines, cherry gummosis, potato  
late blight, potato scab, black scurf  
and wilt of potato, grain smuts.Consideration will also be given to  
some of our worst weeds and some  
of our worst poisonous plants, the  
importance of which every intelligent  
grower understands.Realizing that it is impossible to  
discuss in lectures every problem  
along the line of plant diseases by  
which the growers may be confront-  
ed, Professor H. P. Barnes, Plant Path-  
ologist of the Experimental Station,  
will arrange for individual private  
conferences regarding growers' own  
plant disease problems with any  
growers attending the Farmers' Week  
exercises who avail themselves  
of the privilege. It is hoped that a  
large number of farmers and fruit  
growers can arrange to accept the  
opportunity.
