Timber buying reported active in Coos county.

Hubbard's fine new school house is nearly completed.

Multnomah county expended \$1,629,674 on roads in 1915.

Hood River tax levy is trimmed from \$165,000 to \$130,000.

It takes 715 cars to ship the annual salmon pack of Oregon.

Every sawmill in Linn county expects to be running by Spring.

Shipping rabbits from Lakeview to San Francisco is a new industry.

Gold Beach—Reports state that the big Brookings mill will soon reopen.

A. J. Sigmen of Boston will build a \$100,000 summer hotel at Port Orford.

France asks for bids on 200,000-000 feet of lumber from Northwest mills.

J. C. Penny & Co., of New York, will open new dry goods store in Eugene.

Twohy Bros. may get orders to build 1000 box cars at their Portland shops.

The Johnson sawmill at Coquille is being enlarged to 40,000 feet capacity.

Reports at Paisley say Western Pacific plans feeder into that section of Oregon.

Salem—Chas. K. Spaulding and others have formed a new logging company.

Fine gold is being scraped out of the river bed within the city limits of Roseburg.

The British Government has asked Portland mills for bids on 12,000,000 feet of lumber.

Reports state that the Geo. W. Moore Lumber Co., of Bandon, will soon operate again.

The Hawley Paper Co. of Oregon City will spend \$750,000 enlarging its paper mill at that place.

Oregon Power Co., Marshfield, has spent more than \$40,000 in improvements on Coos Bay in 1915.

Klamath Falls is shipping much livestock, lambs, mules and horses to different parts of the country.

By sharing its profits with employees in 10% increase in wages, the steel trust passes prosperity around and prevents strikes.

The Southern Pacific Co. has ordered 50,000 feet of lumber from Spaulding Logging Co., of Salem, to be shipped to Sacramento.

Plans for Kendall Bros. new railroad out of Roseburg accepted by the city council and crews are expected to begin active work early in March.

Grants Pass people state line they started with \$200,000 bond issue will be completed by Twohy Bros., who have taken it over to Crescent City, California.

Japan has had a great shipbuilding boom and on account of its superior quality Douglas fir is being used extensively, though it costs 70% more than native pine.
