FOREST NOTES.

Ninety-three per cent of the lumber produced in 1914 in the Northwest was represented by seven species—Douglas fir, western yellow pine, redwood, hemlock, cedar, white pine, and larch, covering in amount 7,600,000,000 feet.

Of the total lumber cut in the five northwestern states for 1914, Douglas fir contributed four and three-quarters billion feet, or 58 per cent of the total.

The State of Washington produced in 1914 over three billion feet of Douglas fir, or approximately sixty-five per cent of the Douglas fir produced by the five Northwest and Coast States.

In the Government figures on lumber cut in the Northwest for 1914, mills having an annual production of over 10 million board feet reported 83 per cent of the total lumber produced.

For the 1914 Government figures on lumber cut, 408 mills reported from Oregon and 512 from Washington. From California 175 mills reported, from Idaho 140, and from Montana 124 mills reported.

Reports on wood-using industries have now been issued by thirty-three states. The data embodied in these reports were obtained in cooperation with the Forest service.

Primary power installation in the electrical industry in the western states has increased nearly forty-seven per cent in the three years since 1912.

According to the latest report of the Secretary of Agriculture, 120 public service corporations, out of a total of 1500, claim to own or control a total of 3,683,000 undeveloped water horsepower, or 80 per cent of the total water power at present developed and used in public service corporations.

A study of mistletoe on the Whitman National Forest in eastern Oregon shows that the deterioration of western larch in the more open and exposed stands, is due to the mistletoe parasite.
