**HUGHES DENOUNCES ABANDONMENT OF THE PRINCIPAL OF ARBITRATION.**

In a campaign speeches all across the country from Tennessee to Maine Charles E. Hughes has vigorously denounced the abandonment of the principal of arbitration by President Wilson and the Democratic congress under the duress of the Big Four railroad brotherhoods. Mr. Hughes holds that this trucking surrender of this vital principle by the President and Congress has raised a new and paramount issue in this country, which is:

"Shall this government yield to force?"  
"This country must never know the rule of force," said Mr. Hughes in a speech at Beverly, Mass., on September 7. "It must never know legislation under oppression. I am opposed

to everything which pertains to the exercise of arbitrary power by anyone. That is the strength of our institutions.

"We must never permit the processes of government to be surrendered at the dictates of any power. That is the path to disaster. We might as well give up our democratic government if we are not ruled by reason, if we yield to force.

"I would rather stand on principle and be defeated than yield one jot or tittle of it to get into office. Nothing amounts to anything if we are to decide issues according to the pressure of force instead of in accordance with the dictates of reason."

In his speech at Nashville, on September 4, Mr. Hughes declared that the Wilson Administration had sacrificed principle to political expediency, and announced that he himself stood squarely and unshakably for arbitration of all industrial disputes and would never submit to dictation from any source, no matter what. He made himself perfectly clear, saying:

"I would not surrender to anybody in the country. I believe that anything in this country can be settled right. We have come down the long course of history with the people fighting slowly, now with defeat and now with victory, for recognition of the reign of reason instead of the reign of tyranny and force. We have emerged into a great country, peopled with intelligent men and women.

"I stand for two things: First, for the principle of fair, impartial, thorough, candid arbitration; and, second, for legislation on facts according to the necessities of the case. And I am opposed to being dictated to, either in the Executive Department or in Congress, by any power on earth before the facts are known, and in the absence of the facts. We have a great country and a great future, but it can be preserved only in one way, the way of honest, fair investigation and candid treatment. Show me the way that is right and I will take it; but I won't take any way that I do not know anything about."
