SCHOOL NOTES.

In District No. 6, Geo. W. Muddock is the teacher. The enrollment is twelve. The flag was displayed. The stove is jacketed, a thermometer is provided, and there are window-boards. A new book case has been purchased. The light is admitted from the right side. A blackboard should be placed at the other end of the room, and the seats should be reversed, to obtain the best light.

Miss Zetta Stephens teaches in District No. 3. The enrollment is seven. One framed picture has been provided. The flag was displayed. This school is properly lighted. The outbuildings are sanitary and are kept clean. The pupils are very diligent in their work and are making excellent progress.

In District No. 40, Prof. B. Peir, Prof. N. S. Nedry, Miss Margaret Osten and Miss Etta Adams are in charge of the work. A new flag pole is on the ground and will be erected soon. The floors have been oiled. Two of the rooms are heated and ventilated by means of patent heating and ventilating systems, and the other two rooms have stoves surrounded by good jackets and the windows are provided with good window-boards for ventilation. Water is kept on the stove to furnish moisture for the atmosphere. A new dictionary has been purchased for the high school. There is a good equipment of play apparatus.
