Bend is shipping potatoes east.

Canyon City—Flour mill planned here.

Multnomah county to erect \$150,000 hospital.

Hood River has a candy and glace apple factory.

Grants Pass holds show to boost corn industry.

Stanfield—Alfalfa ranch sells for \$250 per acre.

Scapoose dedicates \$3000 Congregational church.

Dairymen of South Silverton organizing cheese factory.

Albany held a successful home manufacturers banquet.

Grants Pass—"Boast for Beets" is to be Slogan of this city.

Eugene—Willamette Pacific to expend \$50,000 here on terminals.

Medford—Work started on \$25,000 Applegate Lumber Co. sawmill.

Hood River—Utilization of cull apples is still local industry problem.

Eugene—Plans approved for Blair roundhouse Coos Bay line by S. P. Co.

1500 ship carpenters on Willamette & Columbia receive increase in pay.

The Dalles valuations are down \$350,000 and city levy goes up a mill.

Salem—Country Club to erect building—brick block going in on Liberty.

Portland—With \$15,000,000 less valuation tax rate for 1917 not increased.

Klamath Falls—Steel bridge ordered over irrigation canal at Burrell Short ranch.

Roseburg—Pacific Tel. & Tel. Co. to spend \$5320 on new cable between here and Edenbowser.

Marshfield—Oregon Power Co. secures 25 year franchise in Eastside for gas and electric service.

Portland—Pan Pan Chewing Gum Co. capitalized at \$25,000 to be new local industry with factory here.

Shipbuilding is a natural industry for Pacific Coast ports and freight car building a good interior industry.

Oregon Electric planning a two million dollar extension to Cascadia timber holdings for Monarch mills at Portland.

Salem—Each ward of the state costs \$22.47 or about twice as much as each member of a workingman's family gets to live on.

In the offshore lumber trade, Oregon and Washington tide water mills shipped 34,212,787 feet of lumber during the month of October.

Coos Bay State Health Board after analysis of city water supply here states: "Bacteriologically these waters are very good."

Tillamook—Several carloads of Tillamook cheese are being shipped to the East this week. First time in history of the Oregon industry that cheese has been sent from here to the Eastern states.

Salem—A committee of citizens is making a survey to report on reforms needed at the state prison. About all they find really wrong is that the men are kept in idleness and need employment.

J. H. Dyer, Ass't Gen. Mgr. of the Southern Pacific returning from a month's absence brings cheering reports of the car shortage situation and says that the first lot of new cars recently ordered by the S. P. Co. now is beginning to arrive. The cars will be distributed among shippers throughout the Southern Pacific territory, and Oregon will get its share. Business throughout the Pacific Coast is improving says Mr. Dyer.

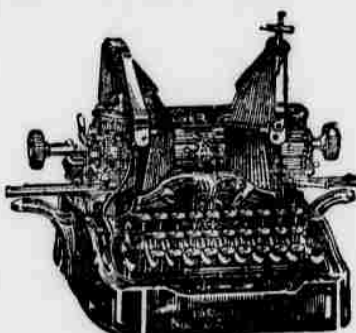
