RESOLUTIONS PASSED BY WOOL GROWERS

The committee on resolutions at the 19th annual convention of the Oregon Wool Growers' Association, was put to work early. During the last hour of the convention they presented the following resolutions which were adopted by the association with but a few minor changes.

The Proposed Increase in Grazing Fees.
WHEREAS the Secretary of Agriculture has proposed to increase the grazing rates for grazing livestock on the National Forest to double the present figure and
WHEREAS in times past the wool business has been carried on to a loss to the growers, and
WHEREAS it must be conceded the wool business at the present is enjoying a period of abnormal prosperity and
WHEREAS under normal conditions it is believed that an increase to double the present rates will be excessive and
WHEREAS it is believed that on a range basis sheep are paying a higher rate than cattle now therefore
BE IT RESOLVED that it is the sense of this convention that should an increase be made it be not greater than fifty per cent of the present rates and that the increase be made gradually and extend over a period of five years.
BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that as much as that under this increase the wool grower will be paying as much as the forage is worth a liberal sum should be appropriated by congress for strict range improvement work in order that the burden of this expense now borne by the stockmen be not added to the increased expense due to paying a higher grazing fee.
WHEREAS it is the desire of the wool growers to procure as much land as possible in their business as possible.
BE IT RESOLVED that the District Forester approve the issuance of five year permits to all worthy wool growers in the National Forests of Oregon without the usual 5 per cent required by the present regulation.

Forest Roads.
RESOLVED that Oregon Wool Growers Association are heartily in favor of the Co-operation of the forestry service with the several counties of this State in putting up a private of the cost of building substantial roads where they are necessary into and across the National Forest. That we consider such improvements of great value to persons handling stock and for the convenience of the traveling public.
Oregon State Live Stock and Sanitary Board.

WHEREAS the success of the livestock industry is dependent upon their freedom from disease; and
WHEREAS dangerous diseases of livestock can best be controlled and eradicated through the agencies of a State Live Stock Sanitary Board, now therefore
BE IT RESOLVED that the Oregon Wool Growers Association Com-mend the Oregon State Live Stock Sanitary Board for their efforts and interest in this connection and in a further effort to extend the helpful sanitary work already started recommend that the Legislature make provision for the appointment of another deputy State Veterinarian inasmuch as a considerable proportion of the moneys appropriated for the Live Stock Board are returned to the State Treasurer unused. Said deputy to be located and have headquarters in Eastern Oregon.

Annual Ram Sale.
WHEREAS the cost of raising wool and mutton has increased materially in the past few years, it has obviously become necessary for the growers to improve the flocks.
THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED that we express our approval of the annual ram sale held at Salt Lake, and recommend that members of the association patronize the same.

Rabies.
WHEREAS the disease of rabies is prevalent among the wild animals of Oregon, and
WHEREAS it has caused the loss of livestock to the amount of many thousands of dollars, and threatens to cause still greater losses, as well as being a serious menace to human life, therefore
BE IT RESOLVED: That we recommend that our present state bounty law be continued and request the legislature of the state of Oregon to appropriate the sum of \$30,000,000, to the State Livestock Sanitary Board to be expended in cooperation with the United States Bureau of Biological Survey for the prevention of rabies and for the extermination of predatory animals.

Conference at N. W. G. Association Convention.
WHEREAS: Rabies can best be controlled by concerted action on the part of the state in which the infection exists, therefore
BE IT RESOLVED that the secretary of the Oregon State Board of Health and the secretary of the Ore-

gon Livestock Sanitary Board be instructed to take the necessary steps to call a conference of the states of Washington, Idaho, California, Nevada, Oregon and Utah to meet in Salt Lake City on the dates of the National Wool Growers Association convention, January 11-13.

Wool Classification.
WHEREAS as much of the wool produced in the Northwest is put up in a slip shod and careless manner resulting in loss to the grower or necessitating expensive grading of same before it goes to the manufacturers, therefore
BE IT RESOLVED that we recommend the classing of wool before it is placed in the original bag and branded in a manner that the buyer may know the proportion of each class in a clip of wool.

Non-Partisan Tariff Commission.
WHEREAS believing our present prosperity is due to war, growth and pestilence in other wool growing nations of the world, and that a return of normal conditions would again place wool and mutton produced in the United States in direct competition with like products in other parts of the world, produced at much less cost, therefore
BE IT RESOLVED that we heartily endorse the action of President Wilson in appointing a non-partisan tariff commission to protect in times of stress, not only the wool and meat growing industry, but every other legitimate industry in the United States.

Stock Trails.
WHEREAS, on account of so much of the public lands passing into private ownership, and the consequent fencing, it is becoming increasingly difficult to move bands of sheep to shipping points and to summer range and
WHEREAS trailing them through narrow county roads imposes hardships and cruelty to the animals themselves, and loss to the owners:
We would respectfully suggest that where proper and continuous stock trails can not be established the Interior Department set aside unappropriated Government land contiguous to approved routes of travel of stock to either shipping station or mountain ranges, at such intervals that stock en transit may have a chance to rest and feed en route.
And we would further recommend that in the future all County Roads hereafter laid off and allowed through a Section of country mainly devoted to stock raising, be ordered established not less than eighty feet in width.

Pacific International Live Stock Exposition.
WHEREAS the Pacific International Livestock Exposition has just closed its sixth annual show—one of the most successful in its history and
WHEREAS the bad weather which was experienced during the entire week convinced the livestock breeders of the country as well as the business men of the community that the show had outgrown its tent stage and must from now on be housed in suitable buildings to the end that the Pacific International may maintain its high place among the other large expositions of the country, therefore
BE IT RESOLVED that the Oregon Wool Growers Association most earnestly endorse the movement to raise sufficient funds to properly finance the proposition and that all its members lend their financial and moral support to this end.

State Educational Institutions.
WHEREAS our boys and girls are our most important livestock and their education our most important problem, therefore
BE IT RESOLVED that we most heartily endorse our State Educational Institutions, and recommend that our rural districts incorporate as high a standing of education as our City Schools, paying particular attention to agriculture and livestock.

National Wool Grower.
REALIZING that much good has been done our industry by the publication of the National Wool Grower, now, therefore
BE IT RESOLVED that this Association continue its moral and financial support of the magazine, in its efforts in our behalf.
And we further urge that all wool growers of the State of Oregon aid themselves and their industry by becoming subscribers to this publication.

Henry Ireland, Condolences.
