### Electric Thief Is Caught

Ashland, Or., Jan. 20—(Special) The city is not only installing tell-tale devices, but is also offering a cash reward for information that will lead to the detection of patrons of the electric light system who are listed on a flat rate for light only, but who steal current for cooking and heating purposes. It is estimated that the city is losing hundreds of dollars a year through the theft of electric current. One arrest has been made and more are expected to follow.

The only remedy is the installation of meters and this plan is gradually supplanting the flat-rate schedules.

## INDUSTRIAL ITEMS OF GENERAL INTEREST

Falls City to have new S. P. depot soon.

Grants Pass—New brick garage to be built.

Roseburg—May build fruit juice plant here.

McMinnville—Milk condensery plant to enlarge.

Oregon is given \$128,111 from the Forest Road Fund.

Total Oregon mineral output in 1916 was \$5,500,000.

Portland—Cerec Mfg. Co. moves here. To employ 25.

Baker—\$60,000 paid for 6500 Wallowa county sheep.

Deer Creek—California company to start cheese factory.

Roseburg—95,000 lbs. Douglas Co. prunes go to England.

Albany—Peppermint growers of state perfect organization.

Eugene will have cheese factory if quantity of milk is available.

Myrtle Point ships carload of cheese directly to New York.

Oregon City and West Linn plan joint municipal paving plant.

Gresham—Fruit cannery to be rebuilt, to also handle vegetables.

Eugene—Coos county co-operates to urge highway from this point.

Umatilla county has increased in wealth nearly \$1,500,000 past year.

Bandon—Fertilizer factory suggested to utilize fish cannery waste.

North Bend—Preliminary work begun on paving waterfront highway.

Coquille—Dollar mill idle since 1912 to again operate and employ 40.

Pendleton—Local syndicate pays \$200,000 for 3600 acre Umatilla ranch.

Portland—Columbia Engineering works increasing facilities to handle six ships.

Astoria—Port Commission to build new dredge. Will improve Skipanon River.

Molalla—\$100,000 company organizes to work fire clay deposits near here.

Pendleton—West End Chop mill changes hands. Will erect large warehouse.

Vale—Stockraising Homestead Act causes big rush for lands. Will add millions to tax rolls.

Umatilla County income tax payers to show big increase account of past years prosperity.

Roseburg—City will control jitneys owing to several recent incidents endangering citizens lives.

Groshen—S. P. Co. purchases and deeds parcel of land to county highway eliminating dangerous crossing.

Gold Beach—Curry county buys rock crusher and equipment to improve roads in northern part of county.

Washington D. C.—River and Harbor bill includes \$80,000 for Oregon City locks and \$36,300 for improving river above docks.

Southern Pacific Co. adopts plan of building all wooden freight cars at own shops and from lumber produced along its lines.

New Era—State to provide \$15,000 for highway here in addition to Clackamas County's \$16,000 and Federal aid of \$30,000.

Portland—Improvements on North Bank, Oregon Electric, Oregon Trunk and United Railways lines for last 12 months have totaled \$500,000.

Due to the enterprise of the Bell System, the whole United States may be enabled to hear Pres. Wilson's inaugural speech on March 5, over long distance telephone.

Grants Pass—Utah-Idaho Sugar Co. lets contract to quarry 2,000 tons limestone annually for 5 years from quarry 18 miles from factory. Will haul with auto trucks.

Bend—Strahorn railroads will develop 28,000 square mile area having 50,000,000,000 ft. of western pine, 10,000,000 acres dry farming land, 50,000,000 acres reclaimable land, salts, sodas, nitrates and potash, cattle and sheep ranges, and vast water-powers.
