ANOTHER HOLSTEIN HEIFER MAKES RECORD

"Another Holstein Makes a World's Record." The press of the country might well keep that oft-repeated announcement as a "standing head," ready for use at a moment's notice, for the reports of Holstein cows breaking world's records in milk and butterfat production have become commonplaces.

Yet, among breeders and dairymen there is a never-ending interest in the wonderful progress in scientific breeding and care which these records signify. There is also a rapidly-growing concern in the breed which is capable of this development.

The Holstein-Friesian heifer Jewel Pontiac Segis 229261, has broken the world's record in the junior two-year-old class of the division covering tests begun not less than 240 days after calving.

There are two remarkable points to be considered in this achievement: First, she exceeded the records of all other cows in her class in both milk and butter production. The former world's record of 21.91 pounds of butter in seven days was held by Finnerne Mutual Payne, while the former world's record of 445.5 pounds of milk in seven days was held by Johanna De Kol. of Rush Court. The record of the new champion is 473.6 pounds of milk containing 22.07 pounds of butter, in seven days.

Secondly, Jewel Pontiac Segis established her record 335 days after freshening and had no special care during the year. In fact, she did not even have a screened stall, but ran in the yard with the herd, during the hot weather and fly time, and was exhibited at the Minneapolis State Fair, where she was passed by many thousands each day, an ordeal which is not considered conducive to the best results, especially in the case of a heifer having the high nervous temperament possessed by the new champion.

She holds the world's record for both the milk and butter in the sixty and ninety day divisions and has now broken the records for milk and butter, and the combination record for both, in the eight-months-after-calving division.

Jewel Pontiac Segis was bred and is owned by J. W. Hackney, of Arden Farms, Inc., of St. Paul, Minnesota. Her sire is King Segis Pontiac Count 93909 and her dam is De Kol Jewel Pontiac 142184.

Had she been given all the advantages usually afford in such tests, there is little doubt that this great two-year-old heifer would have established a new long-time record for her class, in her year's work.

It is of interest to note that Ragner Wahlenburg, herdsman at Arden Farms Inc. who developed Jewel Pontiac Segis, also developed the first seventeen daughters of King Pontiac Segis Count, with an averaged record as junior two-year-olds of more than 21 pounds of butter in seven days.

Oregon legislature actually adjourned, leaving \$974.65 in the treasury.

Public Docks Commission locating site for large public elevator at Portland.

Southern Pacific distributes first half of \$110,000 labor bonus for 1916.

Brownsville—Cannery here has many more orders than it can fill for 1917.

Redmond—Standard Oil Co. building station here to carry full line of its products.

Elk City—Alder timber being shipped from here to Albany furniture factory.

Contract let to place 10,000 tons rock around S. P. Co. Coos Bay bridge piers.

Klamath—New fish hatchery on Crooked Creek to be built—another to be enlarged.

Legislature provided new revenue of \$324,000 and has \$133,000 in emergency fund.

Salem—Bill to spend \$200,000 on home for delinquent children referred to the people.

St. Helens—Clatsop county lets contract for 4 miles grading and paving at cost of \$62,000.

Eugene—Pacific Tel. & Tel. Co., will soon have Marshfield connected with this city by fine line giving first class service.

Portland—Metal Trades Council strike in local shipyards breaking down. More men will be employed as fast as machinery can be installed.

Interstate Commerce Commission has raised lumber rates from all Willamette Valley mills fifty cents per ton, or ten to twenty-five dollars a car.

China gets 2400 miles railroad in 1917 built with American capital. It is to be hoped this year will see conditions that will invite capital to go into American railroads.

Dr. Mervin, Washington Industrial Service Bureau—"Eventually, however, this struggle between capital and labor must yield to an industrial co-operative group in which all interests will be represented fairly."

Grants Pass—Indications are that this city will lose sugar factory built here last year owing to the fact that sufficient quantity of beets cannot be secured. Many other communities are after plant.

Newberg Graphic:—The Southern Pacific log train that is coming in daily now makes music that has a pleasing sound to many ears. It means work for a larger number of hands and this means the payment of many grocery bills and other accounts.

Marshfield—Options have been closed by Eastern concern for more than 100,000 acres of spruce and fir timber land on lower Umpqua and Smith rivers, at a consideration of more than \$3,000,000. A large pulp and paper mill will be established, and cruisers are now ascertaining the amount of paper spruce available.
