Years after, when the girl has married, the doctor comes to visit her husband, an old college chum. Recognizing the wife as the girl of the tragic scene in the hotel, and in love with her daughter, now only in her "teens," the doctor demands as his price of silence that the mother shall give her daughter to him in marriage.

The old nurse, who had attended the wife when a child was born in due time after the tragedy of the country hotel, is now dying and discloses the secret that there was a shift in infants to keep the revenues coming in and it is the substituted boy whom her daughter is now in love with. The daughter elopes with the youth of her choice. The doctor is killed in an automobile accident, and the wife, now sole possessor of her tragic secret, lives blissfully with her devoted husband and her happily married child.
