Auto Accident
While driving home from a trip to Washington Sunday night Victor Martin, George Connell and Hugh Rhea had an automobile accident which seriously injured Connell and Martin and ruined the car.

They were driving at a high rate of speed on a level road when the radius rod broke, letting the front of the car down and causing it to turn over two or three times. Connell and Rhea were caught under the car, and Martin was thrown out through the wind shield. Martin sustained some cuts and had his ankle sprained, but he succeeded in getting the car off the others.

Hugh Rhea was uninjured, and he walked to Umatilla, 15 miles, and telegraphed to Echo for assistance. He made the 15 miles in two and one half hours. The men were brought home the following morning. Connell was so severely bruised that he was confined to bed for some time, and Martin is getting around on crutches.—Echo News.

Stock Growers Who Enlist Retain Grazing Preferences.

Oregon and Washington stock growers having National Forest grazing preferences who enlist in the army or navy will not lose these preferences during the period of their enlistment, even though they do not use the range, is the announcement of District Forester George H. Cecil, Portland, Oregon. In order to hold their preferences they must simply file a statement similar to that now required of State and Federal employees who wish to discontinue use of the range during their term of service without losing their preference. Use of the range in their absence will be provided for by issuing temporary permits to others, with the understanding that the privilege of use terminates when the former permittee returns. Preference privileges temporarily surrendered are subject to any general changes affecting range use which may be made during the absence of the holders.

Wool All In

All of the wool from the Butter creek country that is handled by the Pacific Coast warehouse, is now in, and most of it has been shipped. A lot of 35,000 to 40,000 pounds from near Heppner may be brought over soon, if the road conditions permit.—Echo News.

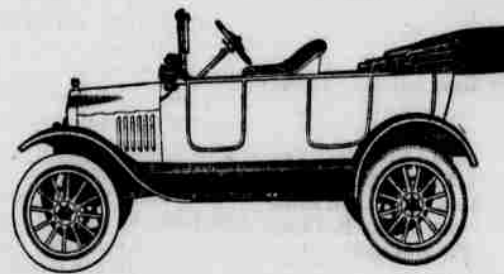
