Canyon City—150,000 daily capac-
ity sawmill building here makes la-
bor very scarce. Railroad construc-
tion to start down middle fork.

Salem—Harvest labor for Eastern
Oregon being contracted at \$5 a day,
board and transportation.

Corvallis has carried bond issue at
election to refund cost of paving in-
tersections to property owners.

The Supreme court has upheld the
law authorizing state bond issue to
equal amount of federal road fund
under Shackleford bill.

Pilot Rock—300,000 pounds of
wool sold here at 61 cents.

The State Grange resolves to abol-
ish the state senate in spite of the
fact that the people have twice voted
no.

Oregon editors will hold conven-
tion in Pendleton July 13-15.

Mosler—Contracts let for three
standard lookout houses.

La Grande Observer: The produc-
tiveness of this valley will be increas-
ed 500,000 bushels by a proper drain-
age system.

Pendleton—Contract has been let
for \$60,000 mausoleum.

Medford to have a \$60,000 cold
storage fruit warehouse.

Mehama—\$7000 clam and fish
hatchery is to be built here.

The Dalles—Food contract bill in
Congress to contain \$20,000,000 item
for Oregon reclamation project.

Coos Bay sawmills continue to op-
erate in spite of effort to tie them
up with a general strike.

Roseburg—Demand for 200,000
fruit boxes may locate box factory
here.

Hood River—New Mitchell Point
sawmill, 6 miles east, employs 60
men.

Pendleton will add 20 blocks bit-
ulthic paving this year.

Toledo will vote August 12 on
\$20,000 bonds to rebuild water sup-
ply.

Sawmill owners who fought down
lumber rates in the past are favoring
the fifteen per cent freight increase
since common lumber has gone up
from \$7 to \$17 a thousand.

Albany—A miracle has happened
in Oregon. A petition has been filed
for the establishment of Linn coun-
ty's first drainage district. The pro-
ject contemplates the drainage of
4815.72 acres adjacent to Oak
Creek. The worn-out, water-logged
farm lands could be made to pro-
duce double with proper tile drain-
age.

McMinnville has dedicated a new
Christian Science church.

The Home Telephone Co. has gone
into the hands of a receiver.

Klamath Falls—First dirt will be
thrown here July 4 on Strahorn rail-
road for which \$300,000 is raised in
cash and bonds.

The annual report of the Portland
Railway, Light & Power Co. shows
a net loss of \$61,170.52. This is a
system where Oregon Public Utility
Commission has ordered still further
reduction in rates.

The warm weather of the past ten
days has been hard on the late sown
grain which is showing the effects of
the drouth very much. This is quite
true all over the county, and unless
rain comes soon, there is much of
the crops that will be a failure. The
prevailing northwest winds have had
a very drying effect and much of the
grain was not in condition to stand
it. Fall sown grain and much of the
early spring sowing yet looks fine,
and should rains come in a short
time, they will make good yields. In
a trip over the wheat belt of the coun-
ty the past week, thousands of acres
of very fine grain was seen by a re-
presentative of this paper, and it was
in such state of advancement that
any serious damage would not seem
possible. We have also been in-
formed by reliable parties that out
toward the sand country the crops
are yet in excellent condition and the
dry weather has so far had no dele-
terious effect. A good rain right now
would be appreciated throughout the
wheat growing section, and we hope
that it will be forthcoming.
