## NEW FAIRBANKS PLAY FULL OF CLEAN COMEDY

Star Goes Adventure Pace in Triangle-Fine Arts "His Picture in the Papers."

After many amusing mishaps, Pete Prindle (Douglas Fairbanks) reaches his ambition and wins the girl of his choice in the comedy drama "His Picture in the Papers." This Fine Arts-Triangle production will be shown at the Star theatre next Sunday and Monday.

Pete is the son of Proteus Prindle, manufacturer of Prindle's Twenty-seven Varieties. After a vegetarian banquet, Pete sneaks out to a shop-house, where he is amazed to find Christine Cadwalader, daughter of Christopher Cadwalader.
