STATE INDUSTRIAL ITEMS OF INTEREST

Baker may build new hotel.
Reedsport—New sawmill to be built here.
Lebanon's new cannery now ready for operation.
A \$9000 schoolhouse is to be built at Boardman.
North Bend—Work being rushed on two new ship ways.
Southern Pacific and 8000 employees arbitrate differences.
Hubbard—Construction on new S. P. station is progressing.
North Bend—Survey for Winchester Bay road completed.
Corvallis—Construction of new Congregational church under way.
Springfield—Local planing mill has order for 1,000,000 tent pins.
Eugene—Contracts let for two bridges on county roads, cost \$3276.
Portland—Columbia river highway will be completed June 1, 1918.
Stayton—New building for ice plant and 3-ton ice machine purchased.

Bandon—1,100 acre Star ranch sold to Hood River man for \$125,000.
North Bend—On account of labor shortage girls are working in box factory here.
Vale—Nitrate properties owned in Vale district, Tacoma Co. will install \$40,000 plant.
Redmond—Irrigation power plant with gigantic capacity being constructed at Oden Falls.
Portland dairymen are hard hit by high cost of hay and men with 260 cows have quit to date.
Salem—Seattle Lumber Co., to mine and operate quarries near Salem. Capitalized at \$100,000.
Portland—\$500 head of sheep were shipped from Elgin, Wallowa, Lostine and other Wallowa county points to Chicago.
Klamath Falls—Strahorn road is now laying rails. First locomotive arrives here just one year after first proposal to build railroad.
Roseburg—Work on North Umpqua dam will begin soon. Hatchery to be enlarged, trout and salmon to be propagated, sawmill is bought.

Oregon City—Temporary plant for wood preparing work planned by Hawley Pulp & Paper Co., for immediate construction, cost \$20,000.
Portland—Employees of the P. R. L. & P. Co. petition state Utility commission to consider favorably the petition of the company for an increase in fares.
Freewater—Rush season now on at Walla Walla Valley Canning and Packing works. 100 barrels of catsup made now—200 barrels pickles and 20 barrels kraut shipped.
Oregon is expected to increase its acreage of fall sown wheat 50 per cent over the same acreage of 1917. An increase of 41 per cent in the acreage of rye is also asked for.

With an increase in equipment of only three per cent, the railroads of this country rendered nearly 26 per cent more freight service in June this year than in the same month last year.
Portland—Falling building to be altered at cost of \$200,000 to make home for Pacific Power & Light Co. and its subsidiaries, the Portland Gas & Coke and Walla Walla Ry. Co. The structure will hereafter be known as "Gasco Bldg."
* With a \$2.20 price set for wheat in Chicago, the Farmers Non-Partisan League is not satisfied and is going to demand \$3.00. In the next breath it demands government control of all big business to hold down prices. Consistency thou art indeed a virtue. Price of Wool is Fixed.
The maximum price that will be paid for wool by the government in all its purchases has been fixed and is announced this morning. It is on a scored wool basis that figures about 50 cents a pound to growers in this locality.
The government does not attempt to regulate the price except for government contracts, but as the government paper has an agreement with dealers for half of their wools at this price, there is little chance of the growers getting more.—Echo News.
