MORROW BANKS MAKE EXCELLENT SHOWING

Morrow county banks make a substantial showing in their reports issued on the 11th of this month in response to a call from the Comptroller of the Currency. In view of the fact that no wheat has been sold in several months and a quiet has reigned supreme in the wool market, so far as local clips are concerned, the showing made by the banks at this time is remarkable, and reflects the steady financial condition of farmers and stockmen generally. In a few weeks the 1917 wheat crop will be on the market, and it is safe to predict that more or less of this years wool crop will have been sold within that time. Bank deposits will leap hundreds of thousands in a short time and will reach a new high record.
