DOLLARS FOR DEMOCRACY.

"The world must be made safe for democracy." These words of ringing truth from the lips of our President are backed by the very sinews of our government. Our armies are marching and our great navy is steaming, both going forth to do battle to the arch enemy, the enemy who has thrown every virtue of modern civilization to the four winds of indiscretion, the enemy of democracy who does his devilish deeds under the flaunting banner of autocracy.

The issue is being met squarely by our people and they are bearing out the idea of the slogan "If you can't go across, then come across, buy a

Liberty Bond."

Unless our enemies are forced to meet the terms presented to them in the name of democracy and freedom, soon there will be another loan. Let's not be slow to answer the call.
