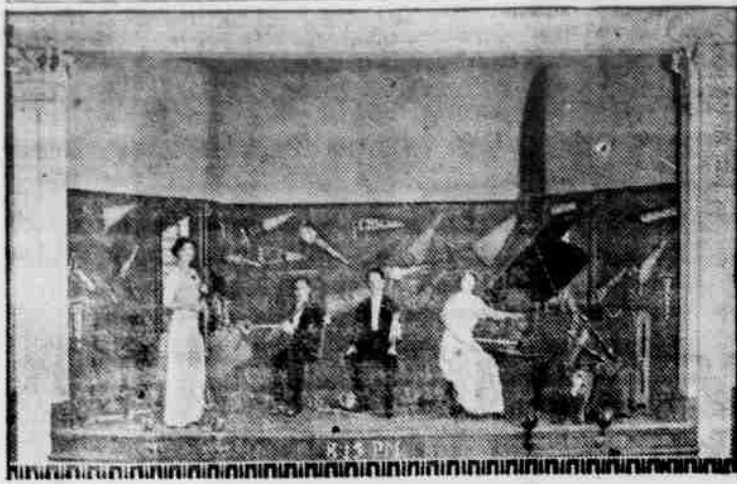

Ralph Parlette, editor of Lyceum Magazine, always in gracious and appreciative mood; commenting on Mr. Wallace Bruce Amsbury in his paper said: "New England has a welcome for the West. She is learning that the wigwags of Illinois now have phones, and that Ohio is commencing to hold Thanksgiving services. That big night of the Lamson Lyceum at New Haven in December is significant. In the audience were six hundred of the professors and students of Yale to hear a lecture by a boy from the prairies. It was Wallace Bruce Amsbury, and he lectured on Kipling, 'The Singer of the Seven Seas' being listened to as one speaking with authority. It was a great event both for Wallace and for Yale. It was a splendid recognition of the prairies and one of the successes of the season."

"Ever meet Amsbury? He don't run much to wood type, but there is a lot to him. He has breathed the spirit of the first covers to the Kankakee and given them a loving introduction to the world in his books, 'The Ballades of Bourbonnais.' He has been fifteen years in the Lyceum, but before that for eleven years he toured America on the stage. He found out that he didn't need a cast and painted forests. We heard him long as an entertainer and reader, but now he is evolving into a rare kind of literary lecturer with demonstrations, which is to give him more abiding fame. Even better than Bruce's art is his heart. I would that it could be distributed as was the first Bruce's heart without injury to his health. We journeyed much through New England, and he was happy every moment. The poorest ple counter got his blessing, and every prospect enthused. Each mile had some fresh joy, and each tomorrow, had more promise."

SHOULD INFORM BOARD OF ADDRESS CHANGES

Portland, Or., Dec. 4.—Every man registered under the draft law who has changed his residence or postoffice address should immediately, without fail, notify his local board of his present address so that he will receive the Questionnaire he is required to fill out under the new draft regulations.

This applies to all registered men, even those previously exempted or discharged. All previous exemptions and discharges from the draft are automatically revoked on December 15.

The Questionnaires will begin to be sent to registered men on December 15. Each man will have seven days in which to fill out answers to the many questions asked and return the Questionnaire to his local board.

Failure to answer the Questionnaire and return it to the board within this seven-day limit will endanger a man's right to claim exemption, regardless of whether he did not receive the Questionnaire.

Hence it is urgent that every registered man whose address has been changed should, for his own protection, at once notify his local board of his change in address.

So important is this matter considered by Provost Marshal General Crowder, at Washington, D. C., that he has issued the following instructions relative to giving it full publicity:

"Please cause the broadest and most extensive and continuous publicity to be given through the Adjutant General, local and district boards and the newspapers, and by all other possible means of warning to all registered men who may have changed their places of abode and postoffice address to communicate immediately with their local boards where they are registered, and furnish their present addresses so that Questionnaires, which will begin to be mailed December 15, will reach such registrants without delay."

"Registrants are bound by law to keep themselves advised of all proceedings in respect of them, and failure to do so may result in their losing right to claim exemption or discharge."
