**OREGON NEEDS HIM**

(Portland Journal)

The arrival of Dr. Kerr in Oregon starts afresh the discussion of the offer made him to become president of the Kansas Agricultural College.

The Kansas bid is an attractive proposition. The institution has an endowment of \$900,000 a year. It stands in the front rank of institutions of its kind. Its location nearer the center of things of the nation places it in closer touch with the big life of the nation.

It has a splendid plant. Its buildings are of stone and all its physical arrangement of the first order. The salary of the president is \$9000 and this, with the high repute of the institution, makes the offer from its board to Dr. Kerr an alluring prospect for any man. The president whose place Dr. Kerr is asked to fill resigned to accept the editorship of the weekly edition of a Kansas City newspaper at \$12,000 a year, which shows something of the opportunities headship of that institution opens up.

No higher compliment could be paid the Oregon Agricultural college than is carried in this call for its president to become president of the Kansas institution. No greater commendation of agricultural progress in Oregon could be given than is contained in the bid for President Kerr's services. There could scarcely be a higher testimonial to the state itself than is this desire to transfer Dr. Kerr to the Kansas field.

It is understood that the decision is soon to be made, and in many ways it is a decision of unusual gravity. There is no known reason why Oregon should give over its educational brains to Kansas and take dubious chances on finding substitute brains. There is no known reason why Oregon should surrender a desirable thing that it has for the benefit of another state. There is no known reason why Oregon, a state largely agricultural and with so much yet to do in agricultural development, should not have the best agricultural leadership obtainable. Kansas to the contrary notwithstanding.

It would be a most difficult matter for Oregon to find another agricultural college president of the Kerr mould or of the Kerr powers, or of the Kerr genius. Those who know much about such things believe him to be as able a college administrator as there is in America. The Kansas board of regents think so, for in its list of applicants for the position offered Dr. Kerr without solicitation from him, are conspicuous educators from the leading institutions of the country.

It is what he has done with the Oregon institution that has made President Kerr sought at Kansas. And what he has done here has been accomplished within 10 years from a very small beginning. It is in a field on the fringe of America, far remote from the center of things educational and affairs national.

The provincial college of that decade back is one of a few of the great institutions from which advanced agricultural and scientific discovery and information are radiated. On account of its high repute, many states are sending young men to it for the training that will make them leaders in the field of American production. Its graduates are called for to take high educational positions in institutions as far away as distant Maine and farthest Florida. It is consequential to Oregon to have an institution that is looked upon as one of the few leaders of agricultural thought and progress in America.

By what he has done, President Kerr knows what can be done, what it yet to be done and how to do it in Oregon. He knows better than any successor could know in years, the people, the places and the possibilities of this field. In this, there is the highest reason for the friends of the Oregon Agricultural college and the people of the state to make it clear to President Kerr that they need him and that they want him.

**Our Loans To Other Nations.**

The United States has loaned to other nations engaged in the war with Germany something over three billion dollars, taking for the sums advanced the obligations of such nations, bearing the same interest and maturing at the same time as the Liberty Loan Bonds.

The wisdom of this policy is beyond question. By strengthening these nations and making them as powerful and as effective as possible we are greatly aiding in the shortening of the struggle; we are doing much to insure an ultimate victory; we are doing only that which it is our duty to do toward our allies in this tremendous war against an autocracy which would debase and enslave all nations and men.

The fact that if we did not advance this money much of the work which the allies are doing would have to be done with American money and American men establishes clearly the intelligence and wisdom of our policy.

There is work to be done which requires the expenditure of blood and treasure. In making these money advances to Great Britain, France, Italy and other nations we are lending money which will be returned to us, instead of expending sums possibly as great, possibly greater, with no hope of return. In addition, we are saving the lives of American soldiers.

No policy the American Government has pursued is wiser or more truly economical and patriotic.
