NEWS OF STATE AND NATION

Washington—Wholesale prices for storage creamery butter have been fixed by the food administration as follows: New York, 47 cents a pound for the remainder of the season. Chicago, 45 1/2 cents a pound until February 1, after which the price will advance 1/4 of a cent every fifteen days. Butter exchanges throughout the country are expected to fix their prices in accordance with this scale.

Chicago—Men and women representing 38 Hungarian societies and more than 30,000 Hungarian citizens, pledged their loyalty to the United States at a mass meeting held under the auspices of the Illinois state council of defense. Resolutions were adopted assuring the president of their appreciation of protection from unjust suspicion of disloyalty.

Chicago—Refusal of packers to arbitrate the eight-hour law, the discharge of 20 union men from Libby, McNeil & Libby, and the resignation of John E. Williams as arbitrator, were given Sunday by the Chicago Federation of Labor as the reasons for the request made by the workers to President Wilson to take over the plants. The men are under agreement with the government not to strike during the war.

New York—As further evidence of the recognition women are receiving in New York politics, comes the appointments of three women to the offices of deputy sheriffs. The appointees furnished the \$10,000 bond required to make access easy to jails and other co-institutions where they are active in welfare work.

Washington—No complaints have been received by the war department from any source as to shortage of food or clothing among General Pershing's forces in France, Secretary Baker declares. If there were such shortages, General Pershing would report them to the secretary said. Some clothing supplies have been bought in France, but this was merely a precautionary measure to prevent a shortage in the event of the delays in arrival of shipments from this side.

New York—A large candy manufacturer announces that he has solved the fuel shortage by sifting his ashes. On every ton of reclaimed cinders he pours one gallon of kerosene and in this way obtains a ton of efficient fuel. The sifting process costs him only \$1 a ton and the kerosene 11 cents a gallon, wholesale. In other words, he is getting good fuel at the rate of \$1.11 a ton. The plan has been so satisfactory that he intends to make it permanent, even after the coal shortage is ended.

Cincinnati—A note of optimism on the condition of the country as a whole was sounded by Miss Jane Adams of Chicago in an address before the Woman's City Club. The noted social worker declared that in her opinion there is nothing to be panicky about, although some hardships must be anticipated and as far as possible prevented. She declared that the closing down order to conserve fuel will cause only a few to suffer. The low salaried, she said, probably would be affected most and woe unto the grocer who refused to grant credit to the man who is out of work for five days.
