ALLOTMENTS ARE MADE FOR FOREST ROADS

The North Pacific District, comprising Oregon, Washington, and Alaska, will receive \$272,422 of the 1919 allotment of funds under section 8 of the Federal Aid Road Act which provides for the use of a million dollars of Federal money a year for ten years to build roads and trails within or partly within the National Forests, according to District Forester Geo. H. Cecil, Portland, who has just received notice from Washington that the Secretary of Agriculture has approved the allotments for the fiscal year ending June 30, 1919. Under this allotment Oregon will receive \$132,796, Washington \$92,565, and Alaska \$47,061. This is about \$6,000 in excess of the 1918 allotment for the District.

Because of National Forest land within their borders, twenty-seven states and the territory of Alaska share in the benefits of this Act. The allotments are made on a basis of the area of National Forest land in the several states and the estimated value of the timber and grazing resources of the Forests.

In order to take advantage of these allotments it is necessary for the local authorities, either state or county, or both, to cooperate in the various road projects, usually on a fifty-fifty basis. The engineering work for forest roads is done under the direction of District Engineer L. I. Howes, of the Office of Public Roads, who cooperates with the Forest Service in its road building operations.

Secretary Houston has already approved the cooperative agreements of seven Federal Aid Forest road projects in the District—the Cooks-Collins road on the Columbia National Forest, the Republic-Wauconda road on the Colville Forest, and the Lake Quinalt road on the Olympic Forest, in Washington, and the Ochoco Canyon road on the Ochoco Forest, the Canyonville-Galesville road on the Umpqua Forest, and two sections of the Medford-Klamath Falls road on the Crater Forest, in Oregon.

Funds to pay the Government's share in the survey and construction of these roads have already been provided from the 1918 Federal Aid Road Act allotment.

NEWS OF STATE AND NATION

Timber workers of Bend, Or., have gone against the proposed eight hour day, declaring that a shorter day would work an injustice to lumber interests.

January snow fall in Chicago has broken all records. The month's total to January 28 was 39.6 inches. The nearest January total is that of 1886, which recorded 26.7 inches. The previous best record for any one month was in February 1896, when 27.8 inches of snow fell.

State Bank Examiner Sargent will resign his position in Oregon to become bank examiner of Federal Reserve banks, according to a statement recently issued by him. It is announced that Mr. Sargent will be allowed to recommend his successor.

Seattle—Thomas A. Wardell, 102 years old and a personal friend of Abraham Lincoln died this morning. He was the oldest resident in the Northwest and had 126 direct descendants.

Washington—On the basis of confidential letters and telegrams from packers' files congressman Henri has charged five big firms with control of prices and division of livestock purchases throughout the United States so as to eliminate competition.

Tacoma—The 91st division hereafter will be known as the Wild West Division. It has been officially christened with that name by the Army and Navy Journal.

Lambs, Lambs, Lambs—80,000 Expected Soon.

The lambing season will soon be here, and a few of the early birds have already arrived at Stanfield Bros. yard. The little fellows seem to enjoy these nice spring days, and just can't hold themselves quiet when the sun shines upon them.

It is estimated that there will be upwards of 80,000 lambs added to the herds of this firm within the next month, and the scarcity of experienced help makes their care a serious question to the management.

The recent slump in the price of mutton has caused shipment to the markets to cease, and this will result in the addition of several thousand lambs and quite a quantity of wool to the available supply.—Stanfield Standard.
