District No. 2 gave a box social hich cleared \$95.60. They intend o buy a \$50 Liberty Bond for the district, soup for hot lunches, and various articles for their new school house. A Red Cross basket sold for \$7.75, the proceeds of which are to go to the Lena Red Cross Branch, of the Morrow County Chapter.

The pupils in district No. 31 surprised their teacher one day last week with a dinner served at the school house. A few patrons were present.
