Number of pupils owning Thrift Stamps ----- 185

Number of pupils who have given an average of three hours per week to some home industry in food production or preparation ----- 171

Are Some of the Women of Heppner Red Cross Slackers?

Are some of the women of Heppner Red Cross slackers? This is the question local Red Cross officials have been asking each other for several weeks. A number of the faithful have been on hand every sewing day at the Red Cross headquarters, others drop in now and then for good, conscientious work while there are still a greater number who seem not to know that we are at war with Germany, that there in France are our boys by the hundreds of thousands and that here at home there is a Red Cross organization which is working overtime to help bring those boys back home to relatives and friends.

Mrs. Phill Cohn, president of the Morrow County Red Cross Chapter would have a greater number of local women take an interest in the work. If possible, in the event of a greater number participating in the work, sewing squads could be formed and then it would not be necessary for the same women to go to headquarters every sewing day to get away with the work. "Many hands make light work," and this is the idea that every woman in Heppner should grasp. The "faithfuls" are not going to quit. The work is far too important and too badly needed to lay down, but more of the women should take an interest. Commendous sewing and cutting rooms have been fitted up in the Natter building on the upper end of Main street and the women find it a nice place in which to work.
