War Department Has Inventions Sec-  
tion.

District Forester George H. Ceil  
has received a copy of a notice sent  
by the Secretary of War to the Sec-  
retary of Agriculture, which states  
that an agency has been created  
within the General Staff of the Army  
for the primary consideration of all  
inventions and suggested ideas of in-  
vention, whether patented or not, of  
a military nature pertaining to the  
Army and which the inventor de-  
sires to submit to the Government  
for inspection, test, development, or  
with a view to its purchase or use.  
The notice states also that should  
applications of this nature be receiv-  
ed in any of the offices of the Depart-  
ment of Agriculture, the same should  
be sent informally and directly to  
the Inventions Section, General Staff,  
Army War College, Washington, D.  
C. Application made in person by  
inventors should be referred to the  
same agency and address.

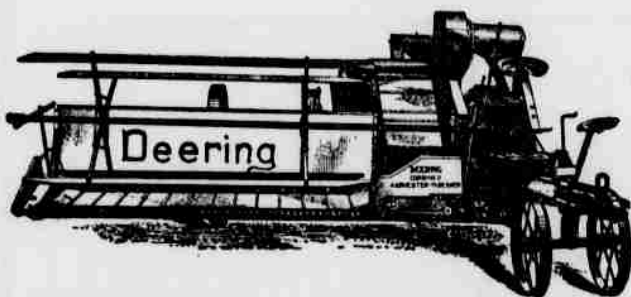
