SUMMONS

IN THE NAME OF THE STATE OF OREGON: You are hereby required to appear and answer the complaint filed against you in the above entitled suit, on or before six weeks from the 25th day of April, 1918, to wit: on or before the 6th day of June, 1918, and if you fail to so appear, or answer, for want thereof, the plaintiff will apply to the Court for judgment against you as prayed for in his complaint, to wit: For judgment against John W. Johnson for the sum of \$55.47 with interest at the rate of six per cent per annum from Sept. 22, 1917, and the further sum of \$1.00 for recording lien and \$15.00 attorney's fee; for the further sum of \$48.35 with interest at the rate of six per cent per annum from October 11, 1917, and the further sum of \$1.40 for recording lien and \$15.00 attorney's fee; for the further sum of \$19.50 with interest at the rate of six per cent per annum from October 1, 1917, and the further sum of \$1.00 for recording lien, and \$15.00 attorney's fee, and for plaintiff's costs and disbursements in this suit; That each of plaintiff's liens are valid and subsisting liens upon the premises herein described, prior to all other liens or claims; that the interests of the defendants Genevieve D.
