ORDINANCE NO. 187.

An ordinance regulating the keeping and storing of gasoline, benzine or distillate within the corporate limits of the city of Heppner, and providing a penalty for the violation thereof.

The people of the city of Heppner do ordain as follows:

Section 1. That no person, firm or corporation shall keep or store within the corporate limits of the city of Heppner, any gasoline, benzine or distillate in any building or structure in a larger quantity than five gallons, or within a distance of one hundred feet of any building or structure, except when the same shall be stored in the tank of a motor propelled vehicle, unless such gasoline, benzine or distillate is so kept or stored in a fire proof container and such container buried in the ground so that the top of such container shall be at least eighteen inches from the surface of the ground.

Section 2. That whenever a greater quantity than one quart or lesser quantity than five gallons of such gasoline, benzine or distillate be stored or kept within the limits of the city of Heppner by any person, firm or corporation said gasoline, benzine or distillate shall be contained in an approved metal gasoline can.

Section 3. Any person, firm or corporation violating any of the provisions of this ordinance, upon conviction thereof in the Recorder's Court, shall be fined by a fine of not more than Fifty Dollars, or by imprisonment in the city jail for a period of not more than twenty five days, or by both such fine and imprisonment.

Passed by the Common Council and approved by the Mayor, this 5th day of August, 1918.

The Service Commission Hearing.

The Public Service Commission of Oregon, represented by H. H. Corey and F. L. Miller, held a hearing in this city last Friday on the application of the Heppner Light & Water Co. to increase rates on light, water and power. Exhaustive reports as to the equipment, plant and franchises of the company were introduced by Mr. Kepar, civil engineer for the commission, and J. L. Stannard, engineer for the company. The city of Heppner had employed T. A. Carrow, civil engineer of Portland, to check up the work of Messrs. Stannard and Kepar, but his report was not completed at the time of the hearing and the case was left open for ten days to give time for his report to be completed and filed.

At the hearing S. E. VanVactor represented the company, while Joe J. Nys and C. E. Woodson looked after the interests of the city. H. V. Gates, president of the company, and O. V. Gates of Hillsboro, also interested in the company, were present. The hearing aroused a great deal of interest and the decision of the commission is being looked for rather eagerly.

Fire Destroys Grain.

A fire Monday evening about 7 o'clock on the Frank Wilson ranch a few miles south of here destroyed a setting of wheat headings. The origin of the fire is not known, but it is thought that it was of incendiary nature. The loss to Mr. Wilson is around \$1500. The circumstances are being investigated by Corporal Cummings of the Heppner Detach, Oregon Military Police.
