WORLD RELIEF WORK.

The inability of the Food Administration to distribute the campaign materials has made it necessary to delay the campaign for further con-

servation of funds. Just as soon as the materials are at hand the work will be taken up.

Simply because the quota of sugar has been increased to four pounds per person per month and the use of wheat flour without substitutes is now permitted, the people must not think that the need of conserving food is over. The need of saving food is greater than ever. In addition to the needs of our allies, we must supply more food to the neutral countries as their stocks of food have been depleted. We must send food to Poland and to the smaller Austrian states which joined us in the closing months of the war. Last year we sent over about twelve million tons of food. This year twenty million tons will be needed. Hence, not an ounce of food should be wasted; no extravagant use should be permitted; and every source of production should be utilized. Mr. Hoover requests that no extra meals be served; that all social functions at which it is planned to serve foods so arranged as to have the luncheon or dinner take the place of a regular meal, if possible. The American people, by an almost purely voluntary effort, have accomplished a saving in food which is almost beyond belief, and there is no doubt as to their ability to do still more. With confidence the administration appeals to the people to save the hungry millions of the earth.

Only an almost negligible minority of the whole people has failed to observe the food regulations cheerfully. It may be well to remind these that, while the restrictions are not so close, the penalties have not been repealed. Some people object to saving food to feed Germany. It has been ascertained that Germany will not require much food, their frantic appeals to the contrary notwithstanding. They will soon be permitted to send their own ships to Argentina and other neutral countries for food, but the distribution will be under the direction of Mr. Hoover's over-seas organization. The Turks are well provided with food. Hungary will be able to take care of herself. Only a small part of Austria outside of those portions we now count as allies must be supplied. Hence, no-one should fail to conserve because he thinks the food will go to the enemy. This is America's golden opportunity to show the world that a free people can do a bigger thing than an autocracy can accomplish by forced regulations. America will once more "go over the top."
