F. A. McMenamin was called to Pendleton on Monday to attend to some income tax matters. He returned home on Wednesday.

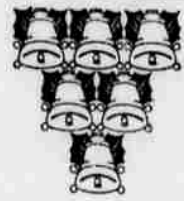
**NOTICE OF ANNUAL STOCKHOLDERS MEETING.**

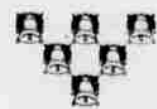
