O. A. C. STATION RENDERS SERVICE

Oregon Agricultural College, Corvallis, Jan. 14.--That the Oregon Agricultural Experiment station through its many activities has been the means of increasing crop production in Oregon and enriching the producers of the state is indicated in the biennial report of the director, A. B. Cordley. The station by prompt action in experimental work was able to render valuable war service.

"The experiment station is a research institution," explains Doctor Cordley. "Its constant endeavor is to learn by investigation--to test, produce new varieties, develop new methods, discover facts and new principles which will be of value in increasing production, decreasing losses, lessening cost of production and increasing and conserving our greatest natural resource, soil fertility.

"The results of our experimental feeding have been of immense value during the war time emergency," continues the report. "In peace times the relative values and availability of various feeds do not change much from time to time and farmers have learned largely by experience which are the cheapest and most desirable but under war time conditions the prices and availability of various feed stuffs changed so rapidly that farmers could not depend upon past experience to show the present relative values of the various feed stuffs. Our experiments enabled us to get specific data on such problems."

The experiment station rendered a valuable service in finding a substitute for pepsin in cheese making. Soon after the outbreak of the war restrictions placed upon commerce cut short the importation of rennet stock which had been necessary as a coagulant in the manufacture of cheese. Pepsin had been used experimentally only and then rather superficially as a substitute. Cheese makers began writing to the experiment station for information on the use of pepsin. The college was operating a cheese factory laboratory, and began immediately investigating the use of pepsin as a substitute for rennet. Within two weeks it was possible to publish a preliminary report indicating how pepsin could be satisfactorily used.
