IS WORTHY OF SUPPORT.

The Young Men's Christian Association has now a history of 15 years of useful service. Its principles and methods have been applied to the needs of young men in the clubs, in colleges and universities, at road division points, industrial centers and to the boys in the country village and on the farm. Organizations flourish in China, Japan and India.

The program conducted in its 600 buildings in the training camps in the United States during the world war have won the universal good will and commendation of the men. Despite the criticisms which some are making of its work in France, the 1600 permanent centers maintained there have always been crowded with men when off duty, availing themselves of the facilities for writing and reading and enjoying movies, entertainments, athletic sports or meetings in educational classes or lectures. The canteen which was taken on as a side line was an enormous undertaking and it is from this that most of the criticism has arisen.

It is not entirely fair to judge the entire Association movement by the weaknesses of its canteen service or by the shortcomings of its personnel in France. It was necessary to recruit about 13,000 men and women from other walks of life, 50% of these had never been members of an Association at home. Most of the criticism offered by returning soldiers are trivial in their nature and are repetitions of stories told by someone else.

The organization should not therefore be judged from this small percentage of mistakes or mistreatment of soldiers but should rather be judged by its years of experience in America by the good work done in the army camps in the United States and by the outstanding constructive side of its program in France. Its primary work in France was to help build both the morals and morale of the army. If we are to believe the reports of General Pershing and other commanding officers, the organization was successful in accomplishing its task. The organization is therefore still worthy of the support and confidence of the American people. Its affairs at home are directed by reputable men in their community in the State and in the nation. The movement to extend the work in Oregon and Idaho which will bring it closer to the boys and young men in the small cities, villages and rural communities is of great importance and deserving of the support of every one in our community.
