Bootleggers Again in Trouble.

Ben F. Jarrell and Bill Clark, two men who were sent up from Umatilla county about a year ago for operating a moonshine still in the mountains back of Pendleton, recently completed a term in the Malheur county jail and are being examined in Astoria before United States Commissioner Carney on a charge of operating a still without filing a bond with the government. No defense was offered by the men, although the defendants pleaded not guilty. They were held to await the action of the federal grand jury with bond fixed at \$1000 each.
