the East.

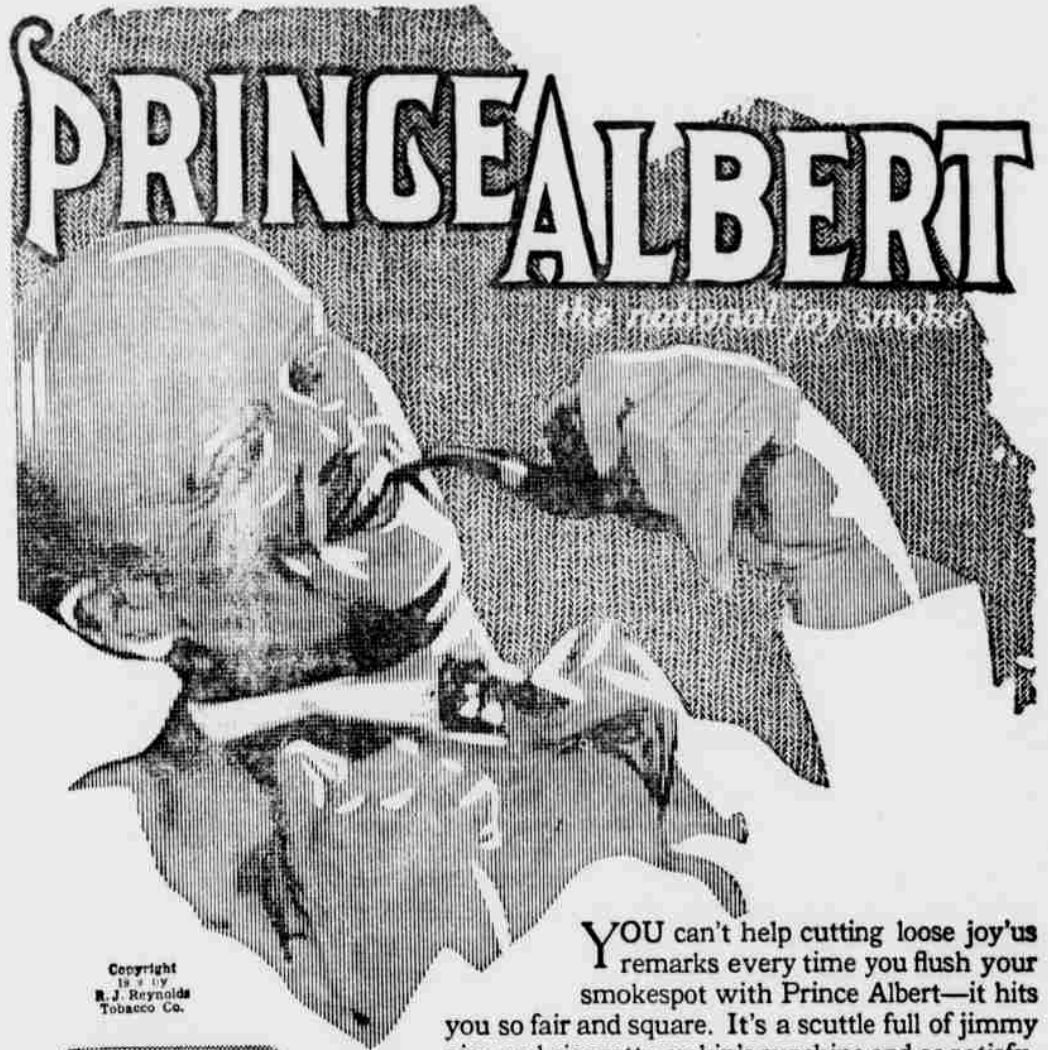
The bereaved family wishes to
