

It doesn't get dark here till after War Tax On Ice Cream And 9 o'clock and daylight comes about 4:30 in the morning, so we saw a lot of country in our 300-mile ride. I was surprised to find France so different from what I had expected. The whole country outside of the war zone is like one big garden. It is just like traveling through a great park. Every inch of tillable land is made to produce something and some of their hillside irrigating systems are wonderful. The fences are all hedges or stone walls and a field is seldom larger than an acre and very irreguiar in shape. At this time they are cutting their hay and their machinery is a scythe and a rake. I saw two binders. They work about as many oxen as horses and haul as much hay on a two-wheeled cart as we do on a regular hay rack.
