**MEMORY OF ROOSEVELT
WILL BE PERPETUATED**

The ideals of Theodore Roosevelt
are to be immortalized—his memory
perpetuated by the people of Ameri-
ca, the country of which this great
American was so justly proud.

Theodore Roosevelt was a man
dear to the people. He was always
an inspiration, making his best ap-
peal, perhaps, and greatest impres-
sion to the young men, millions of
whom have looked upon him as their
leader.

To keep the memory of Roosevelt
before the people, that there may al-
ways be the inspiration of his life,
Americans from coast to coast and
from the Great Lakes to the Gulf of
Mexico, have taken upon themselves
the task of erecting a monumental
memorial as a symbol for future gen-
erations and a visible token of ad-
herence to his ideals.

A campaign for \$10,000,000 will
be launched October 20 to 27 by the
Roosevelt Memorial Association, of
which William Boyce Thompson of
New York is the president. The fund
will be expended in erecting a monu-
ment in Washington, D. C., and for
the purchase of a memorial park at
Oyster Bay and the ultimate pur-
chase of Sagamore Hill, the home of
the Roosevelts.

paign in Oregon include: Bruce Den-
tis, LaGrande; Mrs. Frederick Eg-
gart, Portland; A. F. Fiegel, Port-
land; Mrs. Lawrence T. Harris, Sa-

hausen, Dr. Andrew C. Smith, Port-
land and John H. Smith, Astoria.

A Little Dairy Arithmetic.

National Crop Improvement Service.

The best cow in New Jersey's Cow
Feeding association gave over 13,000
pounds of milk last year and made a
profit over feed of \$220.50. The
poorest cow gave 3,290 pounds of
milk and made a profit over feed of
\$14. The above figures show:

Good Cows	Poor Cows
1 good cow equals	16 poor cows
10 good cows equal	160 poor cows
20 good cows equal	320 poor cows

Twenty cows of the good kind would
return the dairyman a profit over
feed of \$4,410; 20 cows of the poor
kind would eat about the same
amount of feed and would return a
profit of \$280.

In one association the average
yearly production was 7,210 pounds
of milk per cow. Two hundred cows
of this association gave less than
5,550 pounds per cow. If these 200
had been up to the average, it would
have resulted in \$10,260 more money
or the herds in the association.

Are your cows above or below the
average? The cow testing associa-
tion will show you how many pounds
of milk each cow gave and whether
she was an average cow, just above
or just below. A little bit above or
a little bit below means a good many
dollars.

Fire Trespassers Pay Fine.

A fire which burned over twenty-
five acres on the Fremont National
Forest before it was surrounded was
found to have originated in the sheep
camp of Kellaher & Flynn, probably
set by ashes from Kellaher's pipe.

Mr. Flynn agreed to accept the re-
sponsibility in Kellaher's behalf and
went before Justice of the Peace J. S.
Martin, who fined him ten dollars.

Flynn paid the fine and agreed that
his men would care for the fire until
it was out. This fire was reported
almost simultaneously by Forest Ser-
vice lookout men stationed on Hager
mountain and Bald mountain.

August 2, L. J. Stock and W. F.
Smith, campers on the Rainier Na-
tional Forest, were arrested by De-
puty Supervisor Penby at Yakima and
taken before Justice Roy C. King,
where they pleaded guilty to leaving
campfires unextinguished. A recom-
mendation of leniency was made, and
the men were fined ten dollars and
costs.

For leaving a campfire unextin-
guished in Grays Gulch on the Whit-
man National Forest, on August 5,
J. F. Potter, camp tender for Spray
& Tompkins, of Spray, Oregon, plead
guilty before Don L. Willard, Justice
of the peace at Sumpter, Oregon, and
was fined twenty-five dollars. The
fire was discovered and put out by
Forest Ranger Charles F. Groom be-
fore it had gained any headway.

Fossil Bank Enlarges.

The Steiner & Carpenter Bank of
Fossil has increased its capital stock
from \$50,000 to \$100,000, in keep-
ing pace with the progress of the
times and to meet the needs of the
community, says the Fossil Journal.

The bank was started in 1903 with a
capitalization of \$25,000, business
steadily increasing until it is now one
of the strongest interior banks in
Oregon, with resources over half a
million dollars.
