**State Will Follow Federal
Seasons For Duck Hunting**

The Federal seasons for duck shooting will be followed by the State Game authorities, according to an announcement made by Carl D. Shoemaker, State Game Warden. For all of Western Oregon, or Game District No. 1, which takes in all the counties west of the summit of the Cascade mountains, the season opens on October 1st and closes on January 15th, both days inclusive. For Eastern Oregon, or Game District No. 2, the season opens on September 15th and closes on December 31st, both days inclusive.

The courts have uniformly held that the Federal law is supreme and if seasons are to be changed they must come through the Federal Government and not the State. Sportsmen throughout Oregon will, therefore, observe the Federal laws and seasons with reference to the shooting of ducks. However, all other provisions of the State law, with the exception of the opening and closing dates, will be enforced as there is no conflict with reference to bag limits, hours for shooting and method of pursuit. The bag limit for migratory birds is twenty-five in any one day and not to exceed thirty in any seven consecutive days.

**Harry Groshens Is Home
After Two Years In Navy**

Harry Groshen returned to his home in Heppner last week, having received his discharge after spending two years in the United States navy. Harry enlisted shortly after this country had declared war on Germany and after preliminary training at Yerba Buena Island and San Diego, Cal., he was sent east. Mr. Groshen was on the ill-fated warship, the San Diego, when it went down off New York harbor, after having struck a mine. He said the boat, after the explosion, tipped slowly over on its side, and unlike most sinking vessels of such size, there was very little suction, giving the men a chance to escape in the life boats. Mr. Groshen is a son of Mr. and Mrs. Vic Groshen of this city.

GIVE HENS MASH FEED.

It is the practice of the most successful poultrymen to feed a part of the daily grain ration ground. Most of them feed the ground grain moistened with either milk or water, some feed it dry. A fowl's gizzard is capable of grinding all kinds of grain, but it is considered economical to have a part of the grinding done by steam or water power. The soft-feed idea must not be overworked. A beginner often reasons that it is cheaper for the miller than for the fowl to grind the grain; but the powerful muscles of the gizzard are there to be used, and experience has shown that the balance of power of functions in the fowl's economy makes the vigorous exercise of the gizzard beneficial. When feeding moistened ground feed have it comparatively dry, crumbly mash, and not a thin soup. Give what they will eat readily in 15 or 20 minutes.

Community Life Conference.

Oregon Agricultural College, Corvallis, Sept. 8.—That the people on

the farms may have the same opportunities for education, worship, recreation and social contact as those in the city is the big object in view, the college will cooperate with the newly organized farm economics committee of the department of agriculture by holding a community life conference farmers week at O. A. C., December 29-January 3. Prof. E. T. Reed, college editor, has been appointed chairman of a committee to arrange for this conference which is expected to attract many persons from the rural districts of Oregon.
