SHEEP BRING \$102,750.00

Lewiston Deal Is Said to Be Biggest in History of Industry and Old-Timer Will Retire.

Lewiston, Idaho, Sept. 8.—The largest sale of sheep interests by an individual in the history of the industry in the state was announced Saturday, when C. J. Hall, prominent Idaho stockman, sold his Idaho county interests on the upper Snake river to Dobbin & Huffman and the American Falls Development company. In the sale there are involved 3800 head of ewes, 1250 acres of deeded land and the equipment of the Hall sheep camps. The consideration was \$102,750, and Mr. Hall, by the terms of the sale, retains the 1919 clip and this year's lambs.

Mr. Hall, who retires from the sheep-raising business after having spent 20 years at the industry, will make his home in Lewiston, where he has purchased a residence. His principal river camp is at Big Bar, which is above Pittsburg Landing, the head of the recently created Snake river mail route.

At the time he entered the sheep business he began with a band of common run range sheep, which he developed with cross-blood Ramboulet and pure-bred Hampshire Downs into one of the finest bands of sheep in the west.

Denatured Alcohol Is Bad Beverage.—Government Will Label "Poison"

Although we never had any doubts but what denatured alcohol is a poison, it seems that a lot of persons have tried to use it as a beverage with very serious results, such as death, total blindness, general physical decay and attendant ills. The department of internal revenue through a recent bulletin says: "In view of the grave and extended abuse of the use of completely denatured alcohol reported, it is deemed necessary to print upon the label affixed to wholesale and retail packages a further and more specific warning as to its use than is shown on the present required label."

"In addition to the present matter on the labels, there will be required on all new labels hereafter, the printing in large letters in red ink under the skull and cross-bones symbol, the word 'poison' and at the bottom of the label there will be printed the following statement:

"Completely denatured alcohol is a violent poison. It cannot be applied externally to human or animal tissue without seriously injurious results. It cannot be taken internally without inducing blindness and gen-

eral physical decay, ultimately resulting in death."
